

The St. George's School Fair

The school fair which was held at St. George's on Oct. 3, was a decided success.

Although the weather was not very favourable, a large number of people gathered at the St. George's school grounds from the four districts taking part, namely: Cardigan North, Seal River, De Gros Marsh and St. George's. The school room, which was suitably decorated with flags and maple leaves, presented a very pleasing appearance. On the centre tables were invitingly displayed the exhibits in cooking, flowers and fruit. The other exhibits occupied the side tables, while the sewing was hung on lines covered with red and green tissue paper.

The judging was done by Mr. McMillan and Miss McKenna of the staff of the Rural Science Department, Charlottetown.

The sports which took place in an adjoining field formed an interesting feature of the fair and were enjoyed by all.

After the judging and sports were completed brief addresses were made by Mr. McMillan, Inspector Cairns and others. Both Mr. McMillan and Inspector Cairns spoke commendably of the high quality of the exhibits which they declared to be better than those of last year. All spoke of school fairs in the highest terms of praise, both as an inducement to the children to take an interest in agricultural work and of their high practical educational value.

Judging from the enthusiasm shown both by the parents and children, we may expect that next year's fair will even surpass, in the quantity and quality of the exhibits, in the effort and enthusiasm of the children and even in educational value, the very successful fair just closed.

To Pay Debts of Honour

To the Dead and to the richness of their dying,

But to those who have come back in suffering, Canada owes a debt which money can, in part, repay.

It is a Debt of Honour. Canada was pledged to the end, that the wounded and the sick be adequately cared for, until they were fairly fitted for the competitive existence of civil life.

For this purpose, our medical services, and our vocational training schools must be maintained until the need for them is no more.
