IN MEMORIAM

THE DEATH OF MRS. WILLIAM McLEOD, FORMERLY OF HARTSVILLE, P. E. I.

There passed away in Vancouver, B. C., on January 25th, 1935, Mrs. William McLeod, for many years a highly respected resident of Hartsville, P. E. I., at the age of 83.

The late Mrs. McLeod and her husband who predeceased her twenty years ago, settled on a farm at Hartsville in February 1874 where they resided for thirty six years. Descendants of rugged pioneer stock they bravely faced the hardships and sacrifices of more early days, bringing up a family of six sons and two daughters, all of whom grew to manhood and womanhood in the old Prince Edward Island home.

As the sons reached manhood they heard and heeded the insistent call of the Great and Golden West. Soon the majority of the family were seeking fortune in that vast section of the Dominion. Drawn by the mighty magnet of parental love, the parents soon turned their eyes westward also. In December 1899 the dark cloud of a great sorrow first crossed the threshold of the farm-home when the fourth son, Alexander met almost instant death in a mining accident in the West. He was laid to rest in Mountain View Cemetery, Vancouver. Under the burden of so great a sorrow the parents felt impelled to respond to the now irresistible call of B. C., and early in 1910 reached Vancouver.

Zane Grey's "West Of The Pecos" At The Capitol

"West of the Pecos," the latest Richard Dix starring vehicle which opened yesterday at the Capitol has sweep, power and scenic grandeur, and faithfully portrays the vivid days of the old West. And in addition, Dix has another tailor-made role.

The story, from the pen of Zane Grey, shows Dix as Pecos Smith, a two-gun cowboy who was "born under a covered wagon," and has never known any law but that of a clear conscience and a quick draw.

Terrill Lambeth, the girl, played by Martha Sleeper, is the daughter who prefers to be the "son of Colonel Lambeth," a Dixie aristocrat impoverished by the Civil War. When Pecos and the girl meet she is a young cowboy helping her father drive a herd of cattle to the Pecos River range.

The long, hard trek over the Santa Fe trail, with rivers to be forded, Indians to be fought, hunger and thirst to be suffered, is portrayed with thrilling fidelity. The girl's disguise forms the basis for misunderstandings that are laughable at times and tragic at others.

There are bad men to be disposed of, and Dix does it with characteristic neatness. Fred Kohler turns in a striking performance as the chief of the renegades, but he comes to no good end.

One of the funniest pair of composites teamed for pictures in a long time is Sleepy and Louise Beavers, both dusky, one long and lean, the other round and jolly. As the faithful servants of the Lambeths, they portray the light-heartedness of a race that can find humor in adversity.

Martha Sleeper gives a fine performance as the girl.
