HAS VOTED CONSERVATIVE SINCE 1870.—Among the visitors to the city yesterday was Mr. Richard Murley, Murray Harbour, who is in his 88th year and looks sixty. Mr. Murley is in the enjoyment of the best of health and his memory as good as ever it was, he being able to learn new poetry and recite it afterward word perfect. Mr. Murley polled his first Conservative vote in 1870, and has not seen any cause to change his allegiance since. He thinks the electorate has been practically disfranchised by the composition of the present legislature.

Morning Stock Letter

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—American Pete Institute reported an increase in oil for last week of 37,000 barrels. Gasoline inventory figures will be delayed one day. National Supply Co. is going to propose a plan to pay off back dividends on the preferred stock. According to the New York Times for each share of 7 percent preferred and \$35 back dividend as of Oct. 1 stockholders will receive one and one fifth shares of new 5 1/2 percent Pfd and quarter of a share of common. Dividend meetings scheduled for today are Continental Can, General Foods and Woolworth. We would look for an irregular firm market today and would not be surprised if some time during the day the market will be forced to absorb more profit taking than it did yesterday.

TORONTO, Oct. 14.—Moneta.—The directors of Moneta consider the results of diamond drilling to date warrant the underground development of the ore indicated. An electrically driven plant will be installed capable of developing the property to 1000 feet. It is proposed to sink a three compartment shaft to about 500 feet at the present time. 300,000 treasury shares have been sold recently to net the treasury shares \$211,000. The directors consider that sufficient funds to complete the proposed program. A progress report will be sent to the shareholders as soon as possible.

LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, Oct. 14.—(CP)—Livestock markets showed little action today as contracted volume held prices at an unchanged level. Receipts: Cattle 134; calves 188; hogs 71. Five carloads of western cattle were received but not sold in early dealings. Calves were steady with veals bringing \$6 to \$8 for fair to medium good. Grassers traded from \$3 to \$3.25. Good ewes and wethers brought \$7.75, bucks and culls \$5.85 and sheep \$2.50 to \$4. Bacon hogs were \$8.50 with select going at \$1 premium. Butchers and heavies were \$8, extra heavies \$7.50 and lights \$7.50 to \$8. Sows were \$5.50 to \$6.25. A few hogs for \$11.35 rail grade. Lambs sold at \$7.50 on the Maritime section with other livestock prices unchanged.

GRAIN

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—(CP)—Wheat in Chicago reached a new peak price today for the season, May delivery here rising two cents a bushel to \$1.16 1-4. Liverpool and Winnipeg wheat markets led the way, outdoing in some cases the top records of many years. Broader export buying accompanied the bulge in prices, and totalled at one stage 1,800,000 bushels, including 300,000 bushels of United States Pacific Coast wheat. Wheat closed unsettled, 1 cent to 1 1-2 higher, Dec. 116 3-4 7-8; May 115 5-8 3-4; corn unchanged to 3-8 higher, Dec. 95 1-4 3-8, May 90 1-4 3-8; oats 1-8 off to 1-3 up, and provisions varying from 2 cents decline to 17 cents bulge.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 14.—(CP)—Wheat importers dipped anew into Canada's diminishing surplus stocks today, sending the price of nearby futures on the Winnipeg grain exchange to the highest levels in 6 1-2 years. Net advances of 2 3-8 to 1 3-4 cents were registered, with all futures at the close of a whirlwind session glued to the day's ceiling, October and November at \$1.14 7-8 December \$1.12 5-8, and May \$1.13 1-8. Today's export sales totalled more than 1,500,000 bushels, bringing the movement since last Saturday to nearly 4,000,000 bushels. Continental European countries were among the heaviest buyers of the wheat. October and November prices advanced to a top of \$1.14 7-8 where they closed, the dearest quotation for a "nearby" future on the Winnipeg board since April, 1930. Six-year comparisons were not available for December and May options, which were not being traded in at that time. The export movement was reflected in the cash-grain division. Spreads on most grades of wheat improved fractionally, with good demand evidenced. Flax headlined the advance in coarse grains prices, three-cent gains being recorded.

MINING

TORONTO, Oct. 14.—(CP)—The price level of the Toronto mining share market showed a moderate net decline at the end of today's session, with weakness appearing mainly in the gold section. Moneta, less spectacular than Tuesday still held top volume with a trade of 193,000 shares. A net
