Stresses Value Of Fishing Industry

MONTREAL, Oct. 26.—(C.P.)—Fish is nourishing, easily digested and protects health, H.S.F. Paisley, of the Department of Fisheries, Ottawa, told a service club here today. Dealers had on hand an abundance of all types all the year round and there was no need for Canadians to buy imported fish, Paisley said. Every attempt is being made to interest housewives in fresh, frozen, canned, pickled and dry fish, an industry which added \$35,000,000 to \$40,000,000 to the export trade of the Dominion last year. Seventy-eight thousand persons were employed directly and 480,000 indirectly were dependent for a living on the industry he said. Canada's fish week starts next Monday, he reminded his audience.

Sentenced On Assault Charge

BOLOGNA, Italy, Oct. 26.—(A.P.)—Enrico Caruso, son of the late tenor, today was given a suspended sentence of 2½ years after being found guilty in the Court of Assizes of assaulting and seriously injuring a farmer. The attack on the farmer, Battista Monari, was alleged to have occurred October 8, 1930. A brother, Rodolfo, was acquitted. Enrico was not present at the trial, but Rodolfo attended. The two were accused on stopping their automobile beside Monari's oxcart, which had blocked the road, Enrico beating the farmer and throwing him into a ditch with a fractured skull. Completes Foot Examination

Will Head Organization Aiding Jews

GENEVA, Oct. 26.—(A.P.)—The League of Nations appointed James G. McDonald of New York to be High Commissioner of an organization. Independent of the League which will help Jewish refugees from Germany. The United States accepted an invitation to name a representative on the governing body in a note to the Secretary-General which said that "the people of the United States have in times past invariably regarded with a sympathetic interest all the efforts to alleviate the plight of the unfortunate people who find themselves in destitute circumstances beyond their control."

Increase In Wheat Export

OTTAWA, Oct. 26.—(C.P.)—An increase of more than 2,000,000 bushels was shown in export clearances of wheat for the week ending Oct. 20, as compared with the previous week, according to a report issued today by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. A decrease of more than 1,000,000 bushels was shown, however, when compared with the corresponding week of last year.

WOMEN STUDENTS AT OXFORD ARE ASKED TO JOIN OPERA CLUB

LONDON, Oct. 25.—Twenty women undergraduates at Oxford are to be invited to join the Oxford University Opera Club. It is restricted to male members of the university, and at all previous performances the club has had to rely on outside talent for the female members of the cast. Now women undergraduates will appear on the stage for the first time. Another concession has just been made, this time to members of both sexes. In the past undergraduates were only permitted to skate in the afternoons, but now they can skate every night except Saturday and Sunday, provided they become attached to a social club. To join this club members have to prove their efficiency, the test consisting of skating forwards and backwards, and being able to stop.

CANADA'S FISH WEEK

OTTAWA, Oct. 24.—"As head of the Department of Fisheries I am glad to take an opportunity of commending 'Canada's Fish Week' to the attention of the people of the Dominion," said Hon. Alfred Durand, M. P., Acting Minister of Fisheries, in an interview here. "The fishing industry has chosen the period from October 30th to November 4th as the time to be observed this year as 'Fish Week' and I hope that the people all over the country will join in the observance."

"The fishing industry is of great national importance," Hon. Mr. Durand went on. "It is developing extensive natural resources, and it is a source of employment to many of our citizens, both directly and indirectly, as well as a large factor in the country's foreign trade. I think it an excellent thing to have a few days set apart for the special purpose of emphasizing the industry's place among Canada's major productive enterprises and of making better known to our people the wide variety of foods which they may obtain from our fishermen at all seasons of the year. I say 'at all seasons' for the Dominion's fishing industry, energetic and progressive, applies modern methods so efficiently in its operations that there is no time of the year when it does not supply fish and shellfish, either in the fresh or frozen forms or in any one of several processed forms."

"There is never any necessity for Canadian consumers to look for imported fish to meet their requirements. Our own fishermen can meet the need fully, supply fish foods of prime natural quality which are handled and prepared by the industry in accordance with the most approved practice. I would urge Canadian consumers to keep this fact in mind, not only during 'Fish Week', of course but every week, and to remember that in eating fish and shellfish they are using foods which are nourishing and delicious and have been shown by scientific research to contain elements which make them exceptionally valuable in promoting health and in safeguarding the body against certain ills. I am sure none of us would ever touch it."

The district of Belfast is all the poorer in the passing away of Mr. Malcolm B. Beaton of Melville, on Sunday morning, Oct. 22nd, at the home of his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Beaton, of Beaton's Mills. The deceased, who had reached the ripe age of eighty-five years, had been ailing for several months, yet the end came somewhat unexpected.

Mr. Beaton was widely known and deeply respected for his kindly, humble, christian character. He was a faithful communicant of the Belfast Presbyterian Church. On Wednesday afternoon, notwithstanding the heavy downpour of rain, which lasted incessantly for several hours, a very large number of relatives, neighbours and friends gathered to show their last tokens of respect to the departed. The service at the home was conducted by his pastor, Rev. D. L. Griffiths, who spoke eulogistically of the deceased, basing his remarks upon the scriptural quotation, "Let us die the death of the righteous, and let my last end be like his." Favourite hymns of Mr. Beaton's were sung, and Mr. Dave E. Griffiths, by request of the relatives, effectively rendered the solo "My Saviour First of All." Besides a large circle of friends there are of the immediate family of the deceased left to mourn, a sister, Mrs. G. Webb, O'Leary, P. E. I.; a brother, Daniel, in Vancouver; also two sons, Rod and Elwood, in Seattle, U. S. A., and three daughters, Mrs. J. D. McKenzie, Melville; Mrs. J. R. Ross, Flat River; Mrs. A.
