Y. M. C. A. MEETING.—A meeting was held in the Y. M. C. A. tent at the 82nd Regiment Camp on Wednesday evening which was well attended by an appreciative audience of the men. The address by Wesley Steele on the Rural Boys Work Movement in the Islands was listened to with the keenest interest, and the singing from a new song book entitled Great Revival Hymns was most hearty. The meeting closed in a round of applause.

DR. MURRAY MacLAREN, the new president of the Medical Association, is a well known practitioner of St. John and is also a son of the maritime provinces for he was born at Richibucto in 1851. His mother's father came from Prince Edward Island. Dr. MacLaren was educated at St. John Grammar School and U. N. B. where he took the degree of B. A. with honors in natural science in 1870. He married a daughter of the late John W. Nicholson, St. John. He has, too, been associated with the local corps and was a lieutenant-colonel of the Army Medical Corps. He was for some time a senator of U. N. B. and he has taken an active part in all important movements in his native city, especially for the promotion of the public health.

WEDDING BELLS.—A very pretty but quiet wedding was solemnized at St. John's Church, Droxford, Sask., on June 28th, by the Rev. John H. Briscoe, when Miss Queenie Isabell Briscoe of 2240 Columbus St., Vancouver, B. C., and fourth daughter of Mr. William L. Briscoe, Inspector of Game and Fisheries, Ottawa, Ont., was united in the holy bonds of wedlock to Mr. John Elias Beaton of Chaplin, Sask., formerly of Hunter River in this province, and son of Mr. John Beaton. The bride and groom were unattended. The bride wore a dress of Copenhagen satin with pearl trimmings and carried a bouquet of orange blossoms and carnations. The groom's gift to the bride was a La Vallere set with diamond and six fresh water pearls. The young couple left on 7.30 train for Medicine Hat, Alta., where they will spend a short honeymoon, after which they will make their future home in Chaplin, Sask., where they will have congratulations of their many friends.

FARMERS' PICNIC.—The Farmer's Institute Picnic at Kelvin on Saturday last was a big success. The day was ideal and the people of the neighbouring districts fully entered into the spirit of the occasion. Upwards of one-hundred carriages, all filled with men, women and children, were on the grounds, and the total attendance was estimated at 500. The Department of Agriculture was represented by Professor Theodore Ross, Secretary for Agriculture, Professor W. T. Reed, Instructor in animal husbandry, and Professor W. Davison, Instructor in field husbandry, and by Mrs. A. E. Dumbrack, Superintendent of Women's Institutes and Miss McDonald, Assistant superintendent. Seats and a platform for speakers had been erected in the field of Mr. Robert McMurdo in the shade of a beautiful hardwood grove. Addresses were delivered by Professor Ross, Davison and Reed and also by Mrs. Dumbrack and Miss McDonald. There was a live stock judging class. This was the second picnic of the kind held at Kelvin, and it is hoped these picnics will be continued, as they help to solve the problems of country life.

EXAMINATION.—The semi-annual examination of Brackley School which was held on Monday, 29, inst. was an event of more than ordinary occurrence when an unusual crowd from the district gathered to hear the children in their closing exercises. The children were examined by the teacher. The prompt and correct answer of well disciplined children proved beyond the shadow of a doubt the ability of Miss Amy Huestis as a teacher.
