"THE GLOBE" IN DARKNESS.

With an ostentatious parade of its ponderous sympathy and a plentiful lack of very radical information on the subject, the Toronto Globe discusses the representation of the Provinces with special reference to Prince Edward Island. This Province is not pining for sympathy particularly, but it is a very earnest suitor for justice and therefore we cannot permit The Globe's strange ignorance of the facts to pass unbalanced. The Globe writer, whose article is given the leading position on its editorial page on February 5, assumes that Prince Edward Island has lost but one of the six members to which it was entitled by the terms of Union.

Moreover he is equally ill-informed as to the present number of representatives in the Commons for the Province of New Brunswick for he says:—

"New Brunswick, in a similar position in that it, too, has lost a member, but a proportion of one in fifteen is not so serious as one in six."

Almost any bright school-boy of ten years in the public schools of Prince Edward Island could have informed the learned editor of The Globe that Prince Edward Island has lost two of its six members and that New Brunswick has also lost two of its original fifteen and three from its maximum of sixteen members.

The Globe's egregious blunder is thrice repeated in the space of one third of a column. A little below the sentence we have quoted it goes on to say:—

"It will scarcely be considered that the loss of one member each on the part of two Provinces constitutes a sufficiently strong case to warrant us in appearing to abandon the basis of Confederation."

And again at the close of the article in question:—

"The Province (Prince Edward Island) still has as great a representation as it was entitled to by population at the Union."

This third statement imports a new misrepresentation of the facts, in-as-much as this Province was clearly entitled by population to five members when it joined the Union in 1873 and has but four members today.

It was perhaps hardly to be expected that The Globe in its party zeal would take note of the fact that the Island has lost one third of its representation under the present Liberal regime, or of the more important fact that our loss of population, which forms the pretext for thus cutting off the number of our members in the Commons, is here believed to be wholly due to the breach of faith by Canada in not giving us the promised "continuous steam communication with the Mainland" which was the principal reason for the Island entering the Union.

A note from Senator Ferguson under date of February 5 says: "Hon. Mr. Scott promised me last week in the Senate to have the Marconi in operation by Saturday next, and that the service over that line will be free. At every meeting of the Senate for two or three weeks I brought the matter up, and if the communication is not completed according to this promise I will keep it up every day until it is made good." It will be seen that some of our Senators as well as some of our Members are getting in earnest at Ottawa these days. And it is high time they were in earnest.

A VOICE FROM WINNIPEG.

The Winnipeg Telegram (Conservative) is of opinion that "there can be no doubt that the people of Prince Edward Island are serious in their present agitation." It goes on to say that the population is decreasing and "it is not surprising that discontent should manifest itself in the Island Province." The Telegram thinks, moreover that "the Dominion could and should do more to fulfill its obligations to Prince Edward Island." For all of which thanks!

But the Telegram goes on to say that "Prince Edward Island out of Confederation would be a great deal worse off than Prince Edward in Confederation. What the wealth and resources of Canada could not do to bring the Island into participation of the present wave of development, the single effort of the Island certainly cannot do."

And now behold how plain a tale shall put The Telegram down. In 1841 the population of the Island was 47,000; in 1871 it was over 94,000 by the official census in both cases. In thirty years "the single effort of the Island" doubled its population. In thirty-four years in the union with "the wealth and resources of Canada" nominally promised to help us, but denied us by broken faith, the Island has actually lost population, and has fewer people today than in 1873.

We are today without telegraph connection with the rest of Canada for five weeks continuously; we are without anything approaching regular steam communication with the mainland; we have lost one third of our representation at Ottawa. Under these conditions does The Telegram expect us to believe we would be worse off out of Confederation? We pause for a reply.

No, dear Patriot, it is not the story of the Island's wrongs and grievances that hurts our fair Province, but the wrongs, the broken faith and broken promises. That is what hurts and will continue to hurt until these wrongs are redressed. No even the most extreme partisan of the powers that be has entered the discussion to say or to write that successive Governments of Canada have dealt justly with us. Some have indeed said that things are not so bad as they have been represented; all admit that our Province has been shamefully treated. The question is whether these conditions shall go out, and if so, how long?

Under the heading "No Taxation Without Communication" a Charlottetown man in Boston writes: "If instead of begging for a larger subsidy a united, non-partisan electorate in Prince Edward Island adopted the above motto for a rallying cry, the Parliament at Ottawa would be urged to immediate action. Premier Laurier instead of saying pretty nothing as to what her sister Provinces would do for Prince Edward Island when its representation reached the disappearing point; would be placed on the defensive and would be compelled to repudiate or make good the promises of his Government."

What seems to be important is that every Islander in the present crisis shall do what he can according to his best light to promote the welfare of this Province. All cannot see alike in every thing, but all who have this patriotic object, if they cannot work together should work singly to the same end. If one has or thinks he has a better plan than his neighbor let him prove it by doing better service than his neighbor. We have no quarrel with our contemporaries of the Island press who do not altogether approve The Guardian's language and methods on all occasions and we hope to be always ready to commend any earnest effort honestly put forth by any one for the good of our common country whether it exactly accords with our own way of thinking or not.
