FOREST FIRE—A brush fire roared for hours late yesterday afternoon and last night at Grand Tracade before it was brought under control. The blaze spread swiftly. Royal Canadian Mounted Police from Charlottetown directed efforts to control it. Some wood and lumber were destroyed but no buildings burned. Part of the area was cut-over land and part was covered with brush. Constables Stuart Mundy and Goswell of the R.C.M.P. were directing the fire fighters.

HUGE DAY-OLD CHICK TRADE—The peeping of thousands of day-old chicks continues to be heard in express offices throughout this province even at this late date. No figures are available but it is expected last year's record sales of chicks, which totalled probably 378,000 will be greatly exceeded. Last year 178,179 hatchlings were sold and it was estimated another 200,000 were imported from other provinces. This year the local hatch is much larger and the importations appear to have increased also.

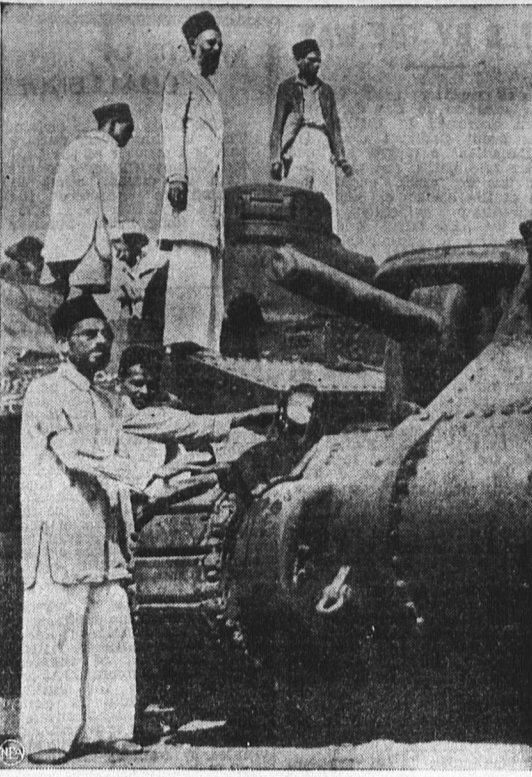

Dr. J. D. MacLean, chairman of the Farm Loan Board, Ottawa, spent the last few days on the island in his annual tour of inspection of the branch offices of the board.

This organization makes loans to farmers, and carries on business in all provinces of Canada, and has over \$1,000,000 loaned in Prince Edward Island. J. A. Lawson is the local manager.

Dr. MacLean is an Islander, and was born in Culloden, in the Belfast district, but when a young man went to British Columbia, where he lived for many years.

He is an M.D., and an LL.D., and for a number of years was prominent in British Columbia politics, holding the portfolios of Minister of Education and Provincial Treasurer.

Juveniles Are Rounded Up

Seventeen boys are due to appear in juvenile court today on charges of juvenile delinquency. The roundup came after investigation by Charles Plant, special investigator for the fire underwriters, of Moncton, assisted by Const. A. J. Lund of the city police.

The probe was launched after a series of fires in Charlottetown. Only recently police and members of the fire department said they believed the blazes were of incendiary origin. In most cases property damage was only slight although loss in one fire was said to be in the vicinity of \$2,000.

Police seized a number of what were described as "match-guns". They were said to be capable of firing a lighted match 15 to 20 feet and are of home construction. The principal part consists of two separate spring clothespins. Police issued an appeal to citizens to assist in locating any more of the guns which might be in existence. They described them as "dangerous".

One boy made several, police were told, and sold them to his companions for a nickel each.

The boys to appear in court are charged with offences ranging from the theft of milk bottles from door steps to the theft of more valuable articles. They were said to be not all members of one "gang" but to be operating in two separate groups and in different parts of the city.

It was not known whether the boys would be charged with starting any of the fires which were put down to the work of a fire-bug.

The resignation of Miss Catherine MacLean as Commissioner of the Prince Edward Island Division, Canada Red Cross Society, was regretfully accepted at an executive meeting held at Red Cross House, on Thursday, July 16th, under the chairmanship of the President, Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan. In accepting Miss MacLean's resignation both Dr. MacMillan and Dr. E. D. Johnson expressed their praise of the excellent work accomplished by Miss MacLean during her tenure of office with the Red Cross. The Honorary Secretary, Mr. R. H. Bowers, was instructed to incorporate in the minutes of the meeting a record of Miss MacLean's achievements.

The executive was pleased to have present at this meeting the complete resignation of Miss MacLean as Commissioner of the Prince Edward Island Division, Canada Red Cross Society, was regretfully accepted at an executive meeting held at Red Cross House, on Thursday, July 16th, under the chairmanship of the President, Dr. W. McGeer Charges False Economy In War Financing

OTTAWA, July 17—(CP)—G. G. McGeer (Lib. Vancouver-Burrard) told the House of Commons today that six monetary reforms which were looked on as "dangerous innovations" in 1934, have been put in operation in Canada and are an essential part of the national economy.

He spoke in support of issuance of national currency during debate on budget resolutions providing for increases in Canadian income tax.

The proposals covered on 1932 but, he said, were a publicly-owned national central bank; removal of the gold reserve limitation on the issue of full legal tender national paper currency; control and regulation of the international movement of currency and credit and investment; control and regulation of international trade; control and regulation of the production and distribution of goods; services and the use of taxation to withdraw from circulation any excess of buying power which would cause an inflationary rise in the price of goods and services.

Mr. McGeer said the government should not reject the use of national currency issues to aid in financing war outlays.

Arthur Slight (Lib. Parry Sound) urged in the House Wednesday night that Finance Minister Iles should issue \$1,200,000,000 in national currency, but the Minister said such an issuance would break the price ceiling and cause inflation.

Mr. McGeer said he knew the dangers of inflation of currency but so long as prices were controlled and the flight from the dollar was prevented by the control and regulation of the movement of currency and credit and investment internationally, the value of money in circulation would not be affected.

The dangerous and insidious form of inflation was not the inflation of currency but the inflation of interest-bearing debt, Mr. McGeer said.

In the depression period people had been told the country's credit would not stand large expenditures for building, employment and defence.

The false economy of the past 10 years in respect to defence was being paid for in blood today.
