CONAN DOYLE RECEIVES MESSAGE FROM LORD NORTHCLIFFE'S SPIRIT

Predicting World disaster Which Will Make the World War Look Insignificant. Prediction Verified by Other Spirits.

(Canadian Press) SAN FRANCISCO, May 31.—Sir Arthur Conan Doyle declares he has a message from Lord Northcliffe's spirit, saying that only a wave of spiritual reform can save the world from plunging headlong into a catastrophe which will make the World War seem insignificant. American people are too busy, Northcliffe said, and that was the mistake he himself made in his life time.
