In Memoriam

MR. SYLVESTER McINNIS There passed away at Selkirk on the morning of April 4th, one of its most estimable residents in the person of Sylvester McInnis. Mr. McInnis was in his seventy-fourth year but in his advanced age his death came as a surprise. He was a man of very strong constitution, and had very little sickness through his long life. He was in his usual good health until one week previous to his death when he was struck down with a heavy attack of influenza, and despite the medical aid and kind attention given him by his neighbors and friends, he passed away on the above date. He was a man of high Christian principles and very strong faith and died fortified by the rites of the Catholic Church, administered to him by Rev. L. P. Callaghan, P.P., of St. Charles, and also his parish priest Rev. George McDonald, who administered to him the last Sacrament. He leaves to mourn one sister, (Mary) Mrs. Ronald McDonald, Forest Hill; and also one son, Peter. His wife predeceased him about eight years ago, and also one daughter (Mary) nine years ago. His funeral took place on April 6th at St. Margarets. A High Mass was celebrated by Rev. George McDonald, P.P., who also conducted the services at the grave. The earthly form was then tenderly laid to rest, beside that of his wife, there to await the day of final resurrection. The pall bearers were: Ronald D. MacInnis, Joseph D. McDonald, Daniel E. 'Y' Financial Campaign Away To Fine Start

The Y.M.C.A. annual financial campaign was in full swing yesterday with 38 per cent of the \$5,000 objective realized in the first day. Campaign workers reported at a dinner meeting in the "Y" last night.

A Division, led by Mr. T. Roy Cudmore was presented with a flag for attaining the highest percentage of its objective. This division obtained \$630.50 out of an objective set at \$1400. Division B, headed by George Craig reported \$515 subscribed yesterday out of an objective of \$1270. Division C, the highest in the campaign in the number of teams, reported \$230 subscribed out of an objective of \$570. Special names' committee, with Mr. A. Pickard in charge, reported \$537 subscribed out of an objective of \$700. A flag was presented George Craig last night for best attendance of campaign workers at the dinner. Total amount subscribed yesterday was \$1911.50.

It might be noted that Lieutenant Governor George D. DeBlois opened the financial drive this year with a very generous donation which greatly cheered workers at the beginning of the campaign. Mr. J. M. MacPadyen, chairman of the general committee in charge of the work, presided at last night's dinner. He spoke briefly and was followed by Mr. Clifford Schell, member of the National Council, Toronto.

Mr. Schell announced the opening night of the campaign last year was slightly behind this year in the per cent of objective realized, 37.8 as compared with 38 per cent this year. Last year, too, there was only a three-day effort against a four-day drive scheduled this year. Mr. MacPadyen expressed his pleasure the campaign was "away to a good start" and asked for continued effort and co-operation.

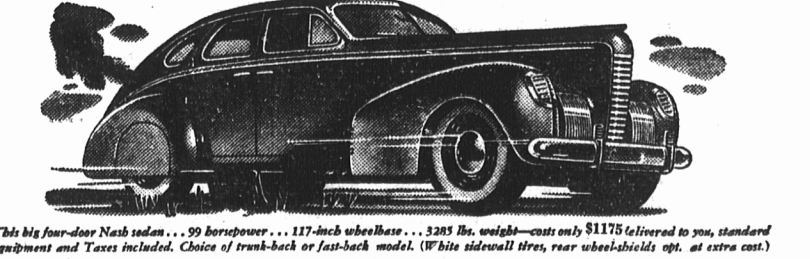
