**AMBULANCE BEARER TELLS OF HIS WORK**

The following letter has been received from Private James Ford by his sister, Mrs. Bruce Constable of this City.

Somewhere in France, June 24th, 1915.

Dear Sister:— I now sit down to answer your most kind and welcome letter which came to hand a short time ago. I am glad to hear that you are well as it leaves me in the best of health at present.

Well we are back about five miles from the front now. We are back for a rest, but we expect to go up again tomorrow night.

We had it pretty warm up there the last time, we were in the thickest of Artillery, maxim and rifle fire, but our corp came out without any casualties. But our poor Canadian boys in the trenches suffered severely from the enemies munitions.

We were kept pretty busy getting the wounded out and carrying them away. Well you asked me to tell you something about the war and how it was going.

We are not allowed to tell you much about it, as our letters have to be censored by our officers.

Our part of the work is to look after the wounded, as you know I am in a field ambulance.

A field ambulance has two divisions, bearer division and a tent division. The bearer division has to go out and collect the wounded and send them back to the tent division, where their wounds get dressed and treated in a civilized manner.

We see some cruel sights. There is some things I would love for you to see; and there are others I hope you will never see.

There is a big battle going on up there now, and I am just as well pleased we are not in it. For it is not much like a street fight or a quarrel on a corner. It makes you think of your happy home when you get into it. But we never think of danger or death.

The island boys in this unit are fine. There are only seven of us. We are the happy boys from the old "number nine." We are always happy, even in the thickest of it we are contented. Any old place we hang our hat is home sweet home to us even if it is hung on a tree.

But the poor fellows beneath the sod, their home is cold but honourable, for three thousand of our Canadian boys have laid down their lives for their King and Country. We never can tell when our turn will come. But when it does we will give our life gladly for our dear old flag.

But we are still living in hopes of seeing our loved ones at home.

I hope that you are having a good time at home, for I tell you my good times are coming.

How is Bruce and all the children, give my love to them, and tell them I am well, so good bye from your loving brother.

**SECRET OF THE RUSSIAN RETREAT IN POLAND**

A Russian official of high standing, at present in the United States for his government, speaking of the inability, so far shown, by the Czar's forces to halt the onward sweep of the Teutonic allies has disclosed a story, already vaguely hinted at, of German treachery whereby at the outset of the war Russia's munition factories were cut out of operation.

Russia, this official says, is still in the greatest need of war supplies. Shipments in anything like extensive volume of guns and ammunition of all sorts have just begun going by way of Pacific Coast ports to Vladivostok, the easternmost point of Siberia, and thence by rail over the Trans-Siberian railway.

The most reliable information is that it will require three months of steady shipment to equip the Russian forces opposing the Austro-German armies in Poland and Galicia in a satisfactory manner. The almost hysterical demands that have come from the Russian government for the speedy forwarding of guns and ammunition evidence a most acute need for them.

There has been a great deal of conjecture as to the cause for the lack of weapons and ammunition adequate properly to equip the Russian army.

The real reason probably has never been told. Russia, before the beginning of the war, was known not only to have maintained factories for the manufacture of guns and ammunition for ordinary needs but to have had a reserve supply sufficient to prevent it from being taken by surprise in the event of war.

The most important factories capable of turning out war materials were in the neighborhood of Petrograd, Moscow, Nizhny Novgorod, Tiflis, Odessa and Sebastopol.

During the forty-eight hours preceding and following the declaration of war by Germany against Russia these plants were put out of business by incendiary fires and dynamite explosions.

The Russians always have felt justified in crediting the destruction of their munitions plants at this critical period in their history to the work of German spies or through the use of German money.

During the tumult that followed the declaration of a state of war between Germany and Russia the outside world knew nothing of the devastation wrought to Russian arms by its enemy, although it now develops that some of the plants were caught re-handled were shot or hanged.

**ACCIDENTAL DEATH OF TWO PRIVATES**

(Special to The Guardian.)

LONDON, Aug. 1.—An inquest was held Saturday on the body of Private Frederick Malcolm Douglas, aged 20, of Kingston, N. B. Douglas, a member of the 6th Mounted Rifles, was killed by lightning the day after his arrival from Canada. Privates Jas. Westwater and Chas. Johnson, of the same battalion, had a narrow escape. An inquest was also held in the case of Private Jos. Victor Harvey, aged 24, of Murray Bay, a member of the 2nd Battalion. He was found shot in his hut with his rifle at his side. A verdict of accidental death was found in both cases.

**ROUND-UP OF GERMAN SPIES IN ENGLAND**

LONDON, July 31.—A British official statement, dealing with the question of espionage, was issued tonight, reading as follows:

"In addition to the five persons whose conviction for espionage has already been announced, the authorities have arrested, at various times recently, the following alleged German agents:

"A—A Dutch subject.

"B—A Dutch subject, recently tried by court martial for attempting to communicate information regarding the fleet; findings and sentence not yet promulgated.

"C—A German with a forged American passport.

"D—A woman of German origin, married to a naturalized British, subject of Prussian birth, from whom she is separated.

"E—A Brazilian of German origin.

"F—A native of Uruguay, of German origin.

"G—A Peruvian of suspected German origin.

"H—A Swede.

"I—German; claims to be a naturalized American.

"J—A British subject.

"Of the above, A, C, H, and I, since their arrest, have made a full confession of their mission. They will be charged with attempting to collect and communicate to the enemy information regarding the fleet and military forces with the intention of assisting the enemy or committing an act preparatory thereon.

"The trials will be in camera. It is not desirable in the public interest to give further details, but it may be stated that as far as is known none of these persons had been in this country longer than three weeks at the time of arrest. Owing to certain measures adopted by the authorities their activities were cut short in their early stages."

**GUNS AND FLAME PROJECTORS DID THE WORK**

LONDON, July 31.—The following official statement was given out by the British war office Friday night: "This (Friday) morning the enemy began a bombardment of our trenches north and south of Hooge (east of Ypres, Belgium) and followed this by an attack with flame projectors, delivered chiefly against the trenches recently captured by us at Hooge. By this means the enemy succeeded in penetrating our first line trenches on a front of about 500 yards. The fighting is still in progress."

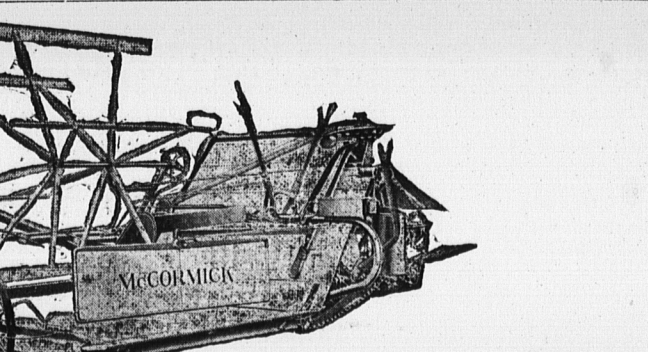
