LIQUOR IN BRITAIN

Licenses Show a Steady Decline in England and Wales

The latest statistics issued by the Home Office in regard to the operation and administration of the laws relating to the sale of intoxicating liquors in England and Wales provide some very instructive figures. Whether these figures go to prove Britishers are becoming a more sober nation or not readers can form their own opinions with the plain, undiluted facts before them.

One outstanding feature revealed by these statistics is that the number of licensed houses has for some years been steadily decreasing. The year's figures show a decrease of 1,237 in the on-licenses and 323 in the off-licenses.

Since 1895 the number of on-licenses has gone down from 103,341 to 91,247, and during the same period the off-licenses have been reduced from 25,405 to 24,115. In considering these reductions it is well to bear in mind the increase in the population, over 4,000,000 during the period in question.

POSTED IN THE DOCK

Vagaries of Persian Tongue Responsible For Lost Letters

The difficulties of the Post Office in the Persian Gulf are aggravated by the Persian language, which invests the word "poost," as colloquially pronounced, with considerable ambiguity of meaning.

"Poos" means a dock or anchorage; "poost" signifies hides, skins, or leather, and is also the term for the post-office. On the coast the final "t" is dropped, and "poos" therefore has to do duty in three capacities.

A merchant at Linga complained that his letters were being lost, and a servant was asked what he had been doing with them.

"The first week," was the reply, "when you told me to carry the letters to the poost I went to the shoe-maker's and was putting them among the poost (meaning leather and skins) but the man said I should carry them to the Poos-Buzurg (meaning the big or British post-office). Then I took them to the Poos Buzurg (big dock) and threw them in. The first time there was plenty of water, but the next week the water was low, and I had to dig a hole in the sand for them."

FOX NEWS

Mr. G. E. Montgomery of Montague received a surprise on his arrival in Charlottetown yesterday when he was handed a cablegram from an oil magnate in Japan asking him to hold a large block of stock in the Carruthers Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd., of Montague. This is a distinct compliment to the silver fox business of the province generally and to the Carruthers Company particularly. The fox name of the province is becoming world-wide.

Mr. B. I. Raynor of Alberton, was in Charlottetown Saturday looking over the ranch of the Bunbury Fox Co. He found conditions exceptionally good. From three pairs of young foxes put in the ranch last fall by Mr. Raynor, there are three healthy litters, eleven pups all told, all of best Raynor guaranteed stock. This speaks well for the caretaker, Mr. Franklyn Boyer, who has followed Mr. Raynor's directions and is also evidently following in his footsteps towards success in the fox business.

In a recent issue The Guardian announced the birth of a litter of seven to a native P. E. Island mink in the ranch of Mr. Nelson Waldron, Tyne Valley. Today from near the same locality comes the announcement of the birth of a litter of eight in the ranch of Mr. J. W. Brown, Northam, this litter also being from a native mink captured at Grand River Ferry last July by Mr. Daniel McCausland and subsequently purchased by Mr. Brown. Encouraging news has now been received from practically all the mink ranches in the province which shows that this industry promises to rival even the fox business in value.

A fox foal was put through here on Saturday last that means the passing of several thousand of P. E. I. dollars into the pockets of two North Sydney men. For some time Messrs. W. J. Kelly and W. J. Christie had four pairs of animals, composed of two pairs of patches and two pairs of well bred reds. They caught the eye of Messrs. Capt. A. A. Macdonald of Georgetown, P. E. I. and Len Wood, the well known farmer and dealer in farm produce of Lot 48 P. E. I. The latter is interested in some of the many black fox ventures on the Island, and knows a thing or two about the value of these fortunemaking animals. Hence it was that he and Mr. Macdonald got in touch with the foxes on the Kelly & Christie ranch.

The price asked was not a very high one, when it came for the judgement of such an expert as Mr. Wood, although to the ear of the ordinary mortal not versed in foxdom the figure would shatter your thoughts and may have with the nervous system. Not so with Messrs. Macdonald and Wood, who became the owners of the four little richly-coated animals at Upper North Sydney. They will remain in their present quarters for some time before being shipped to P. E. Island, where they will no doubt bring big profits to their owners.—North Sydney Exchange.
