 We will not be able to procure any further lots except at a much higher cost. Farmers would be well advised if they sent their order in promptly. We do not pay freight. Wheat shipped to Railway Sidings the freight would have to be added to the cost of the Wheat, but Booking Stations the freight can be paid on arrival at the Station.
