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HAIG'S ESTATE TO BE RENTED LONDON, Eng., Dec. 5—Bermersyde, the beautiful property on the Tweed, which was presented to the late Earl Haig as a personal gift from the people of the Empire, in "grateful testimony of his distinguished services," is to be let on lease for a term of years.

Earl Haig followed his kinsman, Col. Arthur Balfour Haig, in the ownership of Bemersyde, which had been the home of his family for more than 800 years—there were Haigs or De Hags at Bemersyde as early as the 12th century. His succession carried on the old border legend (the words are ascribed to Thomas the Rhymer, or Ericldom): "Tide, tide, whate'er betide, There shall aye be Haig in Bemersyde."

PRODUCE

MONTEAL, Dec. 5—Declines in egg prices featured the produce and furs market here today. Fresh Ontario eggs, in cartons or by dozen, were quoted at 43 to 45 cents, firsts at 39 to 40 cents and halves at 36 to 37 cents a dozen. Storage eggs, in cartons, held unchanged at 21 to 22 cents for extras, 18 to 19 cents for firsts and 16 1/2 to 17 1/2 cents for seconds. Prices to retailers of fresh eggs in cartons, were reduced from two or three cents a dozen. Receipts were 1,427 cases. Heavy deliveries sent poultry prices down one to two cents a pound. Cut of one and two cents were made on the minimum prices of the range for many kinds of dressed poultry. Turkeys held unchanged. Exports of butter from Montreal to the United Kingdom this season only totaled 33,442 boxes as compared with 1931's amount of 152,878 boxes. This year's cheese exports were 334,415 boxes as compared with 908,925 last year. Cartons or less of no 1 grass make butter were quoted unchanged at 21 1/2 to 21 3/4 cents a pound. Receipts were 89 boxes. Cheese held firm. Ontario current receipts being 8 1/2 to 9 1/4 cents with Ontario September 10 1/2 to 11 cents a pound. Receipts were 328. Potatoes were steady. New Brunswick or Prince Edward Island green potatoes, per 80 pound bag, being 10 cents and Prince Edward Island brown potatoes per 80 pound bag, \$1.00.

FRUIT FROM SUNNY SOUTH

(Special to The Guardian) HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 5.—From Jamaica, B. W. I., bringing about 10,000 stems of bananas, 9,000 boxes of citrus fruits and general cargo, the Canadian National Steamships freighter "Cavalier", Captain LeBlanc, arrived Saturday afternoon docking at pier 27 to discharge. About 2,000 cases of fruit were transhipped to the Cunarder "Ascania" for England. The bananas, similar to Nova Scotia apples following the big blow, are classed as windfalls but arrived at Halifax in fine condition due to the excellent refrigeration on board ship. It is expected that the banana crop will not be large this season owing to the extensive damage to the plantations by heavy gales a few weeks ago. The steamer sails on Wednesday for Jamaica.

INCREASES IN PNEUMATIC TIRE EXPORTS

New Zealand was the largest importer of Canadian pneumatic tire casings in October, the number being 7,341 valued at \$52,177. British South Africa got 4,850 at \$29,780, Brazil 4,626 at \$34,936, United States 3,205 at \$33,056, Spain 3,463 at \$25,938. Fifty four countries imported Canadian rubber tires in October, the total being 41,522 at \$322,869, compared with 27,269 at \$167,495 in September and 41,431 at \$337,758 in October, 1931.
