"Cepting Mr. Fred."

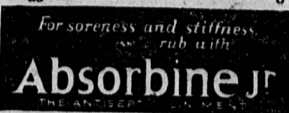
"He's going to be happy, too, Chloe, you see happy making money and keeping busy."

Sir Arthur Currie Welcomed Home

MONTREAL, May 27—Returning to Canada after an absence of nearly a year, General Sir Arthur W. Currie, G. C. M. G., former commander of the Canadian Corps and principal of McGill University, found himself the centre of a demonstration when he descended the gangway of the Canadian Pacific liner, Duchess of York here last night.

It was nearly 10 o'clock before the ship docked, but in spite of the lateness of the hour, and the doubt as to whether the passengers would disembark before Sunday morning, a welcoming crowd had kept patient vigil on the pier for several hours.

A guard of honor from the Canadian Legion, with representatives from Montreal, Ottawa, and Kingston, and another group from the Imperial Veterans, with brass band, were drawn up in the shed, the band playing lively march airs, reminiscent of the roads of France twelve years ago.

Sir Arthur was greeted by General Sir F. O. W. Loomis, K. C. B., former commander of the Third Canadian Division, and by Lieut. Col. L. R. LaFleche, D. S. O., of Ottawa, Vice-President of the Canadian Legion. A bouquet of roses was presented to Lady Currie, following which Sir Arthur inspected the guard of honor. Cheers were raised as the former corps commander walked through the ranks of his old comrades, and was given welcoming handshakes.
