NEVER before have so many pilgrims from a distance visited the shrine of Ste. Anne de Beaupre as during the present season. Already large numbers of pilgrims have come during the last few weeks from Detroit and parts of the New England States, and several days ago the shrine was visited by some three thousand pilgrims from Ottawa, in charge of Archbishop Duhamel and the clergy of the Basilica. They came in three special trains. There were other large pilgrimages at the same time from Lewiston and Oldtown, in the state of Maine, which were in charge of the Dominican Fathers.

"L.E.K." a correspondent writing from Montreal to the American Railway Gazette, says: "In a short time there will be some important changes in the official staff of the Intercolonial Railway system. The Hon. Minister has been assailed in parliament for having so much officialdom on the I. C. R. and as the officials are nearly all appointments made by the Government, he has decided to take his critics at their word and reduce the staff. Such a move may at first sight seem to be unpopular, but it is a business move, and no sensible person can take objection to a reduction of the official staff if it is made in the best interest of the Canadian government railways.—Moncton Transcript.

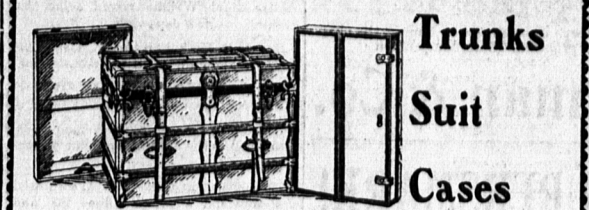
