REPORT of the commissioner of patents, F. I. Allen, for the fiscal year 1900-1901. The report of the United States Commissioner of Patents, just printed shows that there were received in the last fiscal year 42,082 applications for mechanical patents, 2,368 applications for designs, 101 applications for reissues, 1,800 caveats, 2,312 applications for trade-marks, 1,306 applications for labels, and 176 applications for prints. There were 28,481 patents granted, including reissues and designs, and 1,828 trade marks, 624 labels, and 124 prints were registered. The number of patents that expired was 20,080. The number of allowed applications which were by operation of law forfeited for non-payment of financial fees was 4,288. The total receipts of the Office were \$1,408,877.57, the total expenditures were \$1,288,970.13, and the surplus of receipts over expenditures, being the amount, turned into Treasury, was \$119,907.55. Will Not Use X Rays.

BUFFALO, Sept. 12.—Dr. McBurney was in high spirits as he walked away from the residence shortly after the other physician had gone. His face was wreathed in smiles. Asked if the President was out of danger he said: "I believe he is practically out of danger. Of course, we shall all feel better when a week has gone by. But his improvement is so marked, his symptoms are so good, that we feel safe in assuring the public that he will recover. Blood poisoning might still develop, but the chances are remote. As for peritonitis I consider that the danger from that has passed."

Asked if the X rays would be used to extract the second bullet, Dr. McBurney shook his head. "Why should we," he asked, "to satisfy our curiosity. That would be its only purpose. The piece of lead encysted in the muscles of the back will do no harm. If it gives trouble an operation may, of course, be performed." The physicians in attendance upon the President are being deluged with letters and telegrams from people all over the country suggesting remedies and treatment. There is the usual proportion from cranks, but many of them are from well disposed, simple minded persons who evidently have the most implicit faith in the treatment they advise. Some of the letters are accompanied by potent lotions, herbs of every character and one writer enclosed a complete chart of treatment, accompanied by a philosophical and legal analysis, however, to prove that the recovery of the President would save the life of the wretch who assailed him.
