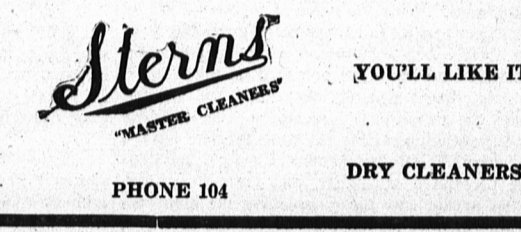

Rail And Utilities Lead Climb

NEW YORK, Nov. 24. — In the heaviest weekend trading since Feb. 10, 1934, the rails and utilities rose to new highs for the year Saturday as the market swept up for gains of 1 to around 5 points.

In more than recovering its loss of Friday, Wall Street observers noted that the rise followed the statement of Marriner Eccles, chairman of the Federal Reserve Board. The statement said: "I think that there is an element of safety and of strength in the fact that the security purchases are being financed out of cash without increased use of bank credit."

While specialties were in good demand throughout the session, the rails staged a sharp rally in the late trading. Brokers said demand was prompted in part by the good showing in October net operating income by some systems.

Evans Products led the specialties, soaring 5% to 34%. Others up 1 to 2 or more were: Collins & Alkmon at 45%, Curtis Publishing at 22% and Gold Duss at 21%.

In the Canadian list gains of a point or more were recorded by International Nickel, Lake Shore, Distillers-Searams and Ford of Canada "A". Canadian Pacific, Hiram Walker, Dome Mines, Massey-Harris, Dominion Stores, Imperial Oil and Canadian Marconi showed fractional improvement.

Measured by the Associated Press average of 60 stocks the market was up 1.1 to 56.0. The hourly pace of trading was considerably faster than on Friday. Transactions for a two-hour session totaled 1,819,130 shares.

Bonds were generally steady to firm in all sections with demand best in the low-priced rail obligations.

"But," objected Eugene Jones, counsel for Mrs. Harrison, "if beauty parlors admitted there was a risk, they'd all go out of business."

"Well," Judge Yarnell replied, "maybe they should. You can't improve on human nature."
