OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 4.—Continuing increasing receipts of fresh eggs continue to depress prices across Canada. Shipments of British Columbia eggs to eastern markets are reported to be moving slowly.

Edmonton egg market is easy under increasing receipts, dealers quoting country shippers extras 45, firsts 40, seconds 30. A considerable quantity of frozen poultry has been disposed of in the United States.

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
