BRIILLANT STUDENTS.—At the convocation of McGill University held on Tuesday last, Mr. Frank E. Gardiner, of this city received the degree of Bachelor of Science, M. Sc. Gardiner passed successfully in all subjects, leading his class in analysis and metallurgy. He has been appointed on a Dominion Government Geological Survey on the Gatheneau River and is now at work. There are four Canadian universities, McGill, Queen's, Toronto and Laval, on this survey and it is considered an honor to be selected to represent McGill. There were only thirteen B. Sc. degrees conferred on Tuesday.

P. E. I. LIGHT HORSE.—The P. E. I. Light Horse, formerly composed of only one squadron, has been raised to the dignity of a regiment of two squadrons. Formerly of a strength of 78 officers and 69 horses, the regiment will now have a strength of 98 officers and men and 89 horses for each squadron, together with a Regimental Staff. "A" Squadron will have its headquarters in Charlottetown and "B" Squadron in Summerside. The Regimental Staff will be made up as follows:—Lieut.-Colonel, Major, Adjutant, Musketry Instructor, Signalling Officer, Quartermaster, Medical Officer, Chaplain, Sergeant-Major, Quartermaster-Sergeant, Orderly Room Sergeant, Sergeant-Instructor, Pay Sergeant, Sergeant-Cook, Signalling Sergeant and Corporal, Medical Officers' Orderly, 7 Batmen, 8 Signallers. The regiment will thus be composed of 229 of all ranks and 201 horses "A" Squadron has received its extra saddlery and equipment and the saddlery, equipment and clothing for "B" Squadron are expected very shortly. Major Powell, D. A. A. and C. M. G. of the Sixth Division, Halifax, was in the city this week transferring the stores of "A" Squadron.

CONSECRATION OF BISHOP LOUIS O'LEARY

Chatham, N. B. June 12.—At the consecration of Rt. Rev. Louis J. O'Leary as Bishop of Hesperopolis, Auxiliary of Chatham, yesterday morning, the Cathedral was filled to its capacity, both the gallery and the main body of the church were crowded, probably seating more than 2,500 people. The ceremony was one of the most impressive ever witnessed here.

At 9 a. m., the procession left the Bishop's Palace. Immediately on their arrival in the Cathedral, the consecration Mass commenced with Mgr. Varrily of Bathurst as master of ceremonies; Monsignor Stagni, the Papal Delegate, as consecrator, was assisted by Fathers Wheten and Sormany, with Fathers Carter and Babineau as deacons of honor.

Rt. Rev. Louis O'Leary was assisted by his brother, the Rt. Rev. Henry O'Leary, Bishop of Charlottetown, and Rev. Dr. A. W. Meahan, parish priest of St. Andrews. After the singing of the gospel, Father Cavalier, president of St. Joseph's College, Memramcook, preached in French on the episcopate, followed in English by Rev. Father Ethelbert, of the Order of Franciscan Monks, Three Rivers, Que. Father Ethelbert is a most forceful speaker, and his eloquent discourse impressed his hearers deeply.

Before continuing the Mass Mgr. Stagni imparted to the congregation the Papal Benediction. Many of the visiting clergy took part in the minor ceremonies, such as the carrying of the cross, book, candle, vestments, etc. The choir of Inkerman, which was brought here especially for this service, rendered the Gregorian Chant with excellent effect.

There were about 100 visiting clergy present, including, besides those taking part in the ceremony, Bishop McNally of Calgary, Rev. Dr. Burke, editor of the Catholic Register and Bishop Scholard. Great credit is due to Rev. M. A. O'Keefe and assistants for the manner in which they conducted and carried out the arrangements for the week's celebrations.

At one o'clock today there was a banquet in St. Thomas' College in honor of the visiting delegates and at which were present only the visiting clergy and those of the diocese.

In the Opera House on Tuesday evening an address and a handsome gold pastoral cross and chain were presented to Bishop O'Leary, by James F. Connors, on behalf of the local Knights of Columbus, C. M. B. A., and A. O. H. Bishop O'Leary replied, speaking in very feeling terms.
