Athletes Train for Olympia

—W. Tanton of The Guardian Branch at Summerside has resigned and will sever his connection with this paper as soon as his successor is decided upon. In the meantime arrangements are in progress to make the future news service from Summerside and vicinity specially interesting and up-to-date.

—The adjourned annual meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade says the Patriot was held Tuesday night with a good attendance, notwithstanding the number of other meetings. In the absence of the president, Joseph Read, who is in Ottawa, Neil McQuarrie occupied the chair. The president's address was read by the chairman, Mr. Stewart reported on behalf of the committee, on the president's address. The report elicited a prolonged discussion which was participated in by Neil McLeod, William Stewart, John M. Clark, W. H. McKie, A. C. Saunders and others. Some discussion took place on the recent institution by the banks of a charge on cheques. The Olympic games themselves are scheduled to begin on July 18, but contests of an international character will begin with a golf tournament on July 1, and will wind up with football, hockey, lacrosse and figure skating in October. The polo at Hurlingham, the yachting at Hurlay, the shooting at Bally, the rowing at Hurlay, and even the Derby at Epsom will have an international flavor.

**THREAT OF DEATH SCARED FRANCO**

Went Across Border With Wife and Son Plotted Against

LISBON, Feb. 11.—The secret and sudden flight of Senor Franco, the former Premier, from Lisbon, across the frontier into Spain, accompanied by his wife and son, was caused by the threat of death which had been made against him. Since the murder of the King of Spain has been in receipt of many letters, all threatening vengeance. Alredy Franco had gone about protected by armed guards, who watched his household and who opposed his iron will should he have been of late arrested those who believed that he was treacherous to the king indirectly for his Sunday's tragedy. Two of Franco's ministers also have disappeared, Senor Carrillo, his said, fearing reprisals after the murder of the king, fled in the garret of the ministry office and he and an opportunity to flee from the city.

The release of several prisoners and other leading republicans from prison today did not occasion any trouble, and others will be released tomorrow. Thirteen persons arrested at the time of the assassination have been released after a most rigid examination, no proof being found against them.
