## Zephra.

Zephra was put on at the Opera House last evening and surprised all with its extent and magnificence. It was a surprise even to the performers themselves, while the large audience were delighted beyond measure with the brilliant spectacular effects, the tuneful melodies and ravishing harmonies which appealed alike to the eye, the ear, and to the aesthetic taste of all. At the same time all who attended, and all who will attend on the three nights yet to come will have the pleasant consciousness that a large portion of the proceeds will be devoted to the Monument Fund—to create a lasting memorial to our brave boys who fought in South Africa, to be a perpetual incentive to our patriotism and an ornament to the Island Capital.

**A GIGANTIC SHOW.**  
Zephra is a gigantic thing from the showman's point of view. From beginning to end it contains 33 musical numbers. It has no less than twelve dances. It takes 150 people to carry out the performance, and those 150 represent the youth and beauty of this city. To render perfect the spectacular effects there are over the stage 39 hanging pieces besides the set scenery. And it all went without a noticeable hitch. **THE STORY OF ZEPHRA.**  
Zephra is a story which is told in brief, plain style: King Decius, the storm king, while passing through his Noreland kingdom one day, discovers in the hut of an old witch a beautiful orphan girl, whom he adopts, and giving her the name of Neyer, decrees that she shall succeed him to the crown and kingdom. Between the clans of King Decius and Prince Juna, who are both subjects of Zephra, the Queen of Myth, there has existed for years a bitter feud, but Juna being a true type of noble manhood, endeavors to effect a reconciliation with the haughty Decius; but each over-urges is repulsed, until at last the doughty prince dons disguise, enters the storm king's castle, determined to ingratiate himself into his affection as to win his favor. He fails in this, but instead meets the beautiful Neyer, who has grown to be a handsome maiden. He wins the promise of her hand in marriage, goes back to his own country, and at the grand annual fete of the queen, at which time are held all the dances, games, and revels of the queen's subjects, he presents himself at court and demands the hand of Neyer in marriage. Enraged at this, Decius banishes away the princess to the ice caves of Noreland. Juna is acquainted of this by the fairy godmother of Neyer. He hastens to Zephra, obtains assistance from her, and after many perilous attempts, rescues the princess from her captors and reveals the peridy of Decius to the Queen, who banishes him forever from her presence.

### Again the Wind Fails the Yachts.

## COLUMBIA OFF FIRST

### But Shamrock Passes Her—Half Mile Ahead When Race Called Off.

**AGAIN THE WIND DIES DOWN.**  
NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—(Special).—There was a fine fifteen mile breeze blowing at 9 o'clock this morning which gave promise of a grand race, but before the start the wind had died away and was blowing only about four miles an hour.

**THE COLUMBIA STARTED FIRST.**  
The Columbia had the best of the start, was well to the windward and crossed the starting line about 45 seconds ahead.

**PASSED BY THE SHAMROCK.**  
The Columbia led for a long time but when nearing the first turn the Shamrock passed her and turned three minutes and eight seconds ahead.

**TIME LIMIT STOPS THE RACE.**  
It took three hours and 45 seconds to cover ten miles and at 3:34 o'clock the race was called off.

The Shamrock was then half a mile in the lead.
