Capt. W. P. Burke of the schooner Hazel B. Miller, Charlottetown, was removed to St. Joseph's Hospital, Sydney, on Saturday afternoon suffering from some internal disease which it is feared is appendicitis.—Sydney Record.

The Mock Parliament met last night. Hon. J. T. McKeenzie occupied the Speaker's chair. After preliminaries the hon. member for Prince, W. A. Scott, in a studied and crucial speech, moved the address in reply. The seconder was the hon. member for King, F. R. Conroy, who gave a fluent and interesting speech. Other members who spoke were the Prime Minister on behalf of the Government, and the hon. member from Winnipeg, R. H. Campbell on behalf of the Opposition. The Parliament then adjourned till next Thursday evening.

A large number of the relatives and friends of the children of St. James' Sunday school were present last night to see them perform at their annual Christmas concert. The happy little people, who were so daintily dressed, were quite charming as they went through their recitations, choruses and dialogues in which they were well trained, and enjoyed performing quite as much as the older ones did to watch them. A pleasant evening was brought to a close by a large Christmas tree which was amply provided with confectionery and fruit.

The Gace Day Gazette says: From reports received from the sick room of Samuel McDonald, the unfortunate young man injured by the recent explosion at the blast furnace here, all hope of his recovery has been given up, and his death is expected at any time. On Wednesday morning about two o'clock his widowed mother, Mrs. Donald McDonald, arrived from her home at Galedonia, P. E. Island. Being the only passenger on the train reaching here, her position was indeed a sad one, not even a night watchman or other official to be seen. By mere chance however, a stranger happened along at the time, and rendered aid to the anxious mother.

The inquest into the death of John McCoy of Mr. Stewart, was concluded on Wednesday, and a verdict returned to the effect that death was due to alcohol poisoning. An examination of the body was made by Dr. McLaughlin, of St. Peter's, who found the lungs congested from exposure and over eight ounces of liquor on the stomach, from which there was a heavy odor of alcohol. There was no organic disease sufficient to cause death. One witness testified to the fact that McCoy and his companions had been drinking on Monday night, and that afterwards had walked to the railway track where McCoy left the coach and had gone along the track alone. The funeral took place on Christmas day at St. Andrew's.

The Kensington Hall Sunday school had a most enjoyable concert last evening. A pretty program consisting of songs, recitations and drills was well received. Special mention should be made of the D. D. D. and the passimors of the Year. The latter was very rhythmic and elegant and very much enjoyed. Carried flowers that would be in season which made a very pretty and artistic scene.
