### Gordon Highlanders' Musketry Trophy, Conditions of Competition—An Illicit Still is Seized in Halifax.

OTTAWA, July 2.—(Special)—There will be a Liberal caucus next week when the proposition of the Government in regard to the bounties on lead and steel will be submitted for consideration.

#### REARRANGEMENT OF BOUNTIES.

There will be a rearrangement of the bounty on steel on the lines already indicated.

#### MUSKetry CHALLENGE TROPHY.

The Musketry Challenge trophy presented to the Dominion Rifle Association by the First Battalion of Gordon Highlanders will be shot for annually by teams of not less than eight members.

The trophy will never become the property of any individual company but will be held by the winning team until won by another.

Uniform will be compulsory. The final details to be arranged annually by the Council of the Dominion Rifle Association.

## PRESBYTERIAN CONVENTION

### Of W. F. M. S. Held in Zion Church Yesterday

### A Good Attendance and Very Interesting Sessions Held—Public Meeting Held in the Evening.

The seventeenth Presbyterian Convention of the W. F. M. S. opened in Zion Church at ten o'clock yesterday morning. The church was prettily decorated with cut flowers and potted plants. The President, Miss Zillah Muirhead, occupied the chair and led the devotional exercises with which the session began. Eighteen delegates responded to the roll call. The following committees were appointed: Nominating Committee—Mrs. Morson, Cardigan; Mrs. Woodside, Hamilton; Miss Clark, Cavendish; Mrs. McArthur, Summerside; Mrs. Fourn, Clifton. Resolutions Committee—Mrs. Rogers, Alberton; Mrs. Wilkinson, Alberton; Miss K. Murchison. Committee on Credentials—Miss Campbell, Charlottetown; Miss McKenzie. Committee on Courtesies—Mrs. Kennedy, Mrs. Sutherland, Miss McLaren, Charlottetown.

After a few remarks by the President the Secretary Miss McNutt, read the annual report. It showed progress financially and in other respects. Some auxiliaries have not yet reported. Twenty three reports increased membership; there are thirty one auxiliaries, 652 members, 78 new members. Receipts to date, \$1344.49 an increase of \$88.00. 421 copies of the Message are taken. Six boxes have been sent to missionaries, value \$50.70. 222 Scattered Helpers an increase of 51. Eight auxiliaries held thanksgiving meetings. Eight new life members are reported. The report closed with earnest words on personal responsibility.

Several ladies spoke to the report after which the President gave out the program for the afternoon and the session closed with singing "Jesus shall reign" and prayer by Mrs. Keeney.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Session opened at 2:30 with devotional exercises led by Mrs. Coffin of Charlottetown, who gave a very helpful Bible reading on Fruit Bearing. A solo sweetly rendered was given by Mrs. Robb, after which the meeting was called to order for business. The report of Young People's Work read by Mrs. Rogers of Alberton showed considerable advancement in this department. Next came an excellent paper on Practical Work in Y. P. Societies by Mrs. McArthur of Summerside. Mrs. Kennedy introduced Mrs. Down and Mrs. Large who brought greetings from Grace Church and First Methodist Church. The President, Miss Muirhead, then delivered the annual address. She touched on the subject of personal responsibility and then took up the question of the proposed amendment of the constitution of the Society and explained it fully. A lively discussion followed in which a number of ladies took part. The Convention unanimously voted against any change.

Questions were next the order of the day—all of which were answered satisfactorily. At this point the roll of delegates was again called when thirty-five responded, and the session was brought to a close with a Doxology and Benediction.

### EVENING MEETING.

The public meeting in connection with the Presbyterian Convention of the W. F. M. S. was held in Zion Church last evening and was unusually bright and inspiring. D. B. McLeod presided and the other speakers were Rev. F. D. Coffin and Rev. M. McLusoh. A hearty address of welcome was very graciously tendered by Mrs. A. W. Robb and replied to by Miss Muirhead. Other good things were done by Miss Harris and Mr. Stanley, a solo by Mr. Stanley, recitation by Miss McKeig G. Hill, "Lazarus was raised" and song by Miss Myrtle Starke, Miss "Father's dream," and excellent music by Zion Church Choir. The usual collection was taken and the meeting closed with the benediction.

### SUPREME COURT.

The prisoners were arraigned at the Supreme Court yesterday. Joseph Carver, the murderer of Alex. Stewart, upon whom attention centered was as unconcerned as ever. He was slightly paler than on his preliminary examination resulting no doubt from his imprisonment but was considerably fatter. In reply to the Clerk of the Court's question he replied firmly "Not Guilty."

The King vs Joseph Carver—On being asked when he would be ready for trial Mr. Mellish stated that he would be ready on July 13th. The Chief Justice refused to allow the case to be held off till that date and it was finally put down for July 6th.

The King vs Catherine McNeill—In this case A. J. B. Mellish, attorney for the prisoner asked that she be discharged as no bill was found. The Court thereupon discharged her.

The dates for the trial of the other criminal cases have been set down as follows:—The King vs John Bell, three charges, larceny July 8th, housebreaking and larceny, July 7th, attempt to break jail July 6th.

The King vs Malcolm McLeod, assault with attempt to do bodily harm, July 6th.

The King vs William McCallum. The prisoner did not appear and the Court on the application of the Attorney General ordered a bench warrant to issue.

Jas. St. C. Moore vs Breanleok, action on promissory note. Judgment for plaintiff \$80.60. Reginald Stewart for plaintiff. Bennett McEachern vs J. F. Wear, action of damages. Mr. McLean K. C. counsel for plaintiff presented his argument, and asked for final judgment. Mr. Weeks counsel for the defendant will be ready to present his argument on Saturday next.
