THE S. S. MONTCALM.

The shortening days and lengthening nights admonish us that the season of warm weather is swiftly drawing to a close, and visions of winter conditions cross the minds of many as they store their coal supply. We need fuel for the cold weather and prudent householders place a supply in advance. We also need to prepare for our winter communication with the outside world. We have felt in years past the need of another and stronger winter steamer. Our people, our Legislature and our members at Ottawa have urged this matter upon the attention of the Government.

Just now it is fitting that we inquire where we are. The steamer of double ice-breaking power for which we had hoped and which was promised, us has not been built. The alternative—the S.S. Montcalm—which was proposed to take the place of the promised new steamer—seems just now to be surrounded with a vague uncertainty. Hints have been thrown out that the Montcalm is of too deep draught to enter Pictou harbor under severe winter conditions. Moreover, our Quebec friends appear to take it for granted that the Montcalm is to be wholly utilized on the St. Lawrence during the coming winter.

The Quebec Board of Trade appears to hold this view. About a week ago this body resolved to instruct "the Hon. Minister of Marine and Fisheries to take steps after the close of navigation to have the ice-breaker Montcalm make at least one trip monthly to Seven Islands, Point aux Esquimaux and Tadoussac." Evidently this powerful board has no notion of the Montcalm's coming here at all. Minister Brodeur has declared that the small winter boat now being built is for the St. Lawrence, so unless we bestir ourselves the prospect of a third winter boat for Prince Edward Island would not seem to be particularly bright.

We point out these things in order that those who have influence with the Government may bestir themselves in time. Mr. Hughes, M. P., Hon. James Richards, Hon. Messrs Warburton and Simpson, as recognized and responsible advisers of the Ottawa Government, should see to it, before it becomes too late, that nothing may be permitted to interfere with our having the third boat in the Straits service this winter. The need is so obvious and so great and the present prospects so clouded with uncertainty that something should be done at once to obtain from the Government an assurance that the Montcalm will be sent us for the coming winter.

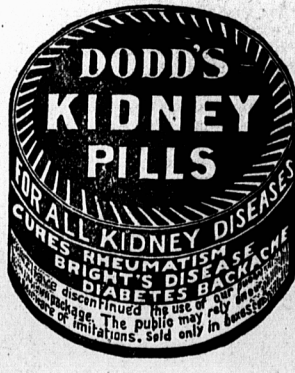
Governor Snowball's term as Chief Magistrate of New Brunswick is shortly to expire and politicians, press and people over there are discussing the claims of various persons to be his successor. The names of Senator Ellis, Ex-Governor McClellan, Senator King and Senator McSweeney are mentioned in this connection. In regard to the Governorship, the vacant Senatorships, present and prospective, and available candidates for both, no newspaper furnishes so much information and comment of value and interest as the St. John New Freeman. The New Freeman's Onlooker sees many things which escape the notice of less alert and less astute observers.

It is gratifying to learn from the Montreal Transcript that in the first ten weeks of the current fiscal year (the earnings of the International Railway increased \$243,000 over the like period last year.

Japan at the last session of its Parliament adopted a law to nationalise all the company railways in the country, some seventeen in all. 91% of these have now been taken over, 1,556 miles in aggregate length, at the cost of \$123,503,883. The purchase price is paid in state bonds bearing 5 per cent interest, the bonds redeemable in five years.

Mr. Bryan has hedged on the question of public ownership of railways. He now says that in his famous New York speech he merely expressed his personal views, but is ready to accept whatever principle the Democratic party may lay down in its presidential platform. Mr. Borden as leader of the Canadian Opposition, in his speech at Truro the other day, made state ownership a plank in the Conservative platform. Now it would seem that in this Mr. Borden is less wise than Mr. Bryan. The Conservative party has not yet accepted the principle of Government ownership. Some of the leading Conservative newspapers seem irreconcilably opposed to the principle, although Premiers Whitney and Roblin openly favor it. The party is clearly divided on this issue, which Mr. Borden is forcing to the front.

The Guardian endeavors to treat serious matters seriously, but we regarded it as not so much a serious as a jocular matter when Dr. McNeill denounced all the public men of this Province as politicians and not statesmen. So sweeping a judgment against so many prominent persons naturally directed attention to the judge who pronounced it, and it was just there that the risibilities, not of The Guardian alone but of the public, were touched. We sincerely regret that the learned doctor cannot himself realize the humor of the situation. The medical profession have a very conservative rule against advertising their professional abilities or cures, or criticizing their brother doctors. Hence when we see a political doctor constantly advertising himself, posing in striking attitudes on the sky line of public observation and decrying all others, it strikes us as funny, and a fair subject for a snapshot by the newspaper camera.

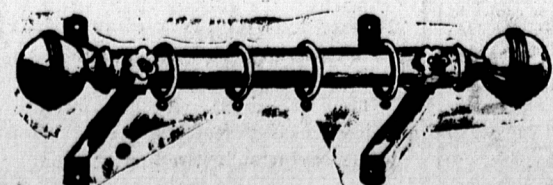
