WHAT THEY EAT AT THE CAPITAL By A. L. Wyman, M. C. A. Philadelphia, Aug. 7, 1920 We arrived at Philadelphia this morning after two weeks spent in Baltimore and Washington, D. C. and have secured many interesting and practical recipes from cooks and caterers in these two cities.

Fried Chicken Platter One of her specialties is a fried chicken platter. On this platter is placed a half of a fried chicken, the chicken is first split, the neck and wings removed, it is then parboiled for fifteen minutes, removed from the water and when it is cold it is fried a golden brown in butter.

Another Crab Dish An odd crab dish is served at this cafe and is made by boiling one medium sized eggplant until tender, the neck and cut in dice, drained of all the juice, four cups of crab meat, three well beaten eggs and a seasoning of pepper and salt.

Dutch Oven Chicken This week has an old Dutch oven which she claims is the best to fry chicken in and she lays her chicken out in salt water for two or three hours, then dries them, seasons them with salt and pepper and covers them with all the dry flour they will hold.

Sour Cream Waffles For breakfast, lunch and dinner these are delicious. They are made by heating the yolks of three eggs until light then add two cups of cream, in which has been dissolved one teaspoon of soda and three and a half cups of flour, beat smooth and add three well beaten egg whites.

Black Fruit Cake For a black cake this cook beats to a cream one and three quarters cups of butter and two and a quarter cups of flour, when well creamed beat in eleven eggs and beat smooth.

Sponge Cake Trifle What she calls a trifle would make dessert fit for a banquet. Bake a sponge cake in a plain round pan, about four inches deep, when baked and cold, cut out the center, leaving a wall about one inch in thickness all around.

RIGA, Sept. 1.—Actual relief work for the starving of Soviet Russia by the American Relief Administration was well under way today.

Dr. Fridtjof Nansen and a party of companions returned today from Moscow, and he is going to Paris to endeavor to raise £10,000,000 in the form of European government loans to aid in the famine relief.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 1.—The Princess Louise of the British Columbia Coast Service Line, was successfully launched Monday in the Wallace Shipyard. She bears the distinction of being the first marine passenger vessel constructed in British Columbia.

TOKIO, Sept. 31.—Premier Hara and Field Marshal Prince Yamagata, one of the elder statesmen, had a lengthy conversation yesterday which newspapers here understood was entirely devoted to the conference on disarmament and Far Eastern questions.
