Dorothy Dix's Letter Box

Slack and Whining Wives Can Take a Lesson From This Pioneer Woman, Who Braved the Dangers of Two Frontiers, Scourges and Disaster, Yet at 96 Thinks Life is Still Glorious

Dear Miss Dix—About three-quarters of a century ago my mother and father made their way in the West and settled in Chicago when it was little more than a trading post. They went about making a living and a home. Had children, as all women in those days did. Neighboring women substituted for doctor and nurse and thought it was right and proper. They had done very well when the Chicago fire took everything they had except the clothes they wore, even the deed to the little property they had acquired, and all county records, too were burned. She started over again. Had some more babies, thru a severe scourge of scarlet fever and diphtheria that took her two oldest sons, just little fellows, both within two weeks. A third child escaped it by a miracle. Then she took sick. This lasted a year or more.

Back on her feet, she started further West with my father and her two remaining children. They went about the very border of the Indian territory. She helped in the store or trading post, as it was, ran the farm and had some more children. If a neighbor woman was to have a baby (and neighbors were so demoralized in ten miles) she was called, pulled on her boots, mounted a buckboard or on horseback, regardless of weather, delivered the baby and back again in time to milk the cow at daybreak.

Back in Illinois she had seen Lincoln, both alive and dead. She had heard Stephen A. Douglas debate with him. She knew generals returned from the Civil War whose names adon history. In the wild frontier she had been besieged all night in a dugout by hungry coyotes; she had seen Sitting Bull and Crazy Snake. She had seen Buffalo Bill, Wild Bill Hickok and Calamity Jane. She had seen General Nelson A. Miles, who took Sitting Bull prisoner. She had seen the Pony Express.

She had pulled the corrugated iron shutters tight, first on the dugout and later on the little house, and watched the Indians on the war path trail across her property, sneaking everything in sight. She had seen bells decorated with human scalps. She had seen soldiers and Indians fight it out. She had witnessed the hanging of a horse thief after a trial by "Judge Lynch."

Fire caught up with her again; burned the general store and house and, with her children, she barely escaped alive. After the fire she and my father thought that things must be better "back East," so they returned to Chicago which had won their hearts when they were first there, and because they thought that the educational and cultural advantages for children were superior to the prairie of the frontier.

Now she is 96 years old. At 84 she could see without glasses. At 90 she went blind. At 92 she fell down the stairs and broke both arms. Owing to her age the doctor set the breaks without any anesthetic and she joked with him as he did it. Miraculously the bones knitted and today, although in darkness, she is cheerful and knows what Hitler and Mussolini are doing in the Congress and has an idea of what she thinks the Administration is trying to do or for the farmer.

She never had much time to go to church, although she sent her children, but she did have time to read the Bible over and over. She believed that use of alcohol as a beverage was a sin and should be a crime. Profanity and blasphemy and unclean thoughts found no place in her consciousness. She believed that the United States was the greatest Government ever conceived by man.

She seldom saw a newspaper, but up it the time her children were grown and away Harpers Monthly Magazine followed her everywhere and she read it cover to cover, including advertisements, and didn't think twenty miles to the nearest postoffice to get it. She thought sulphur and molasses were sovereign for most ills. She has descendants on the Atlantic Coast and on the Pacific Coast and she marries all this thing merely something that won't come back to her. Her seemingly one regret is that she didn't take a trip in an airplane before she lost her sight, so she could see how things look from a mile in the air.

Sticking Windows

Irene's Snow Cake

1 Cup Butter
2 Cups Sugar
1 Tsp. Vanilla
1/4 Cup Milk
1/2 Tsp. Baking Powder
3 1/2 Cups Sifted Robin Hood Flour
1/4 Tsp. Salt
6 Eggs Whites (beaten stiff but not dry)

1.—Cream the butter and one cup of sugar until light and fluffy. Add the egg-yolting.

2.—Sift together the flour, salt and baking powder.

3.—Beat the egg whites until stiff and gradually beat in remaining sugar.

4.—Add the sifted flour mixture gradually to the creamed mixture. Mix well.

5.—Fold in the beaten egg and sugar mixture.

6.—Pour into a well greased loaf pan. Bake in a moderate oven (325°F) for one hour. Cool and cover with a white icing.

GLUE SIZE COATING IS USED ON BURLAP

To paint over walls hung with dyed burlap such as one often finds in old houses, first apply a thin coating of glue size to the burlap. This serves to coat the loosely woven fabric with a smooth filler and lessens the tendency of the dyes to bleed through the ensuing coats of paint.

Glue size is prepared in the following manner: Pour one gallon of hot water over one pound of ground glue (which you can obtain at your paint store). Place the container which holds the mixture over hot water on the stove and allow it to cook in this double boiler fashion until the crystals are completely dissolved.
