STARS WIN BASEBALL GAME ON KING'S BIRTHDAY

Large Attendance And Excellent Weather Favor Players And Fans Who Thoroughly Enjoyed A Nine Innings Contest Of Good Ball.

On Friday, June 3rd, the Rovers and Stars met on the Abegweit diamond in their first clash of the season and went the full route to a 8 to 3 score in favor of the Stars.

The Stars were right on their toes and were never seen in better form. McQuaid, the Stars twirler, had sixteen strike outs to his credit out of thirty three batters to face him. Stan Ryan on the Key stone sack was playing heads up ball. Bolger the Ty Cobb of the City League was batting for a thousand. McCabe on the receiving end for the Stars plays nice ball and is tapping to the outer garden. McCarey on first and Lynds on third were very effective in the infield and are hitting well up. Howatt at Short is filling the Stars one weak spot in good shape, while Bill Ryan and Martin in the right and left garden are always on their job but in Friday's game were not called on for any assistance.

For the Rovers, Connors and Cullen the battery for the Rovers, worked well, Connors pitched good ball, and kept the hard batting Stars to scattered hits, having six strike outs from a total of thirty-six batters.

Blanchard at first and Williams at second, turned in real good ball. Doyle at third and McInnis at Short were good, but a couple of hot ones got through, however, McInnis came through with a nice left handed catch that drew a big hand. McKenzie in the left garden also pulled down a couple of nice ones. Whalen and Diamond at centre and right did not have a chance to come through.

First Innings

Rovers — Whalen, McInnis and Cullen, the first three up could not find McQuaid. No runs.

Stars — McCarey tapped the first ball over to Blanchard at first. B. Ryan sent a roller to Williams, out at first. Lynds takes three. No runs.

Second Innings

Rovers — G. McKenzie hit by pitched ball, thrown out by McCabe stealing second. Williams and Diamond strike out. No runs.

Stars — S. Ryan connects for a two bagger, Bolger singles, McQuaid thrown out at first by Williams while Ryan scores. Martin singles and Bolger scores, while McCabe swings out. 2 runs.

Third Innings

Rovers — Blanchard takes three. Doyle pops out to McQuaid. Connors swings out. No runs.

Stars — Howatt lines one to Doyle. McCarey draws a ball pass, steals second and third, and scores, when B. Ryan sends a hot one through Short and was caught napping on first by Connors; Lynds drops a short one to Connors, out at first. 1 run.

Fourth Innings

Rovers — Whalen and McInnis strike out. Cullen gets first, steals second, caught going to third by McCabe. No runs.

Stars — S. Ryan lines out inside third and goes to second on overthrow, steals third and scores on pass ball. Bolger singles, steals second, McQuaid takes three.

Fifth Innings

Rovers — G. McKenzie out at first by McQuaid. Williams out at first by Stan Ryan. Diamond struck out. No runs.

Stars — Howatt reaches first on overthrow, steals second. McCarey singles and steals second with Howatt on third, who scores on B. Ryan's sacrifice to Williams, thrown out at first. Lynds drives a liner over second scoring McCarey, out stealing second by Cullen. S. Ryan drops a nice one into G. McKenzie's glove. 2 runs.

Sixth Innings

Rovers — Blanchard swings out. Doyle shoots one through short, an then caught gazing at first by McQuaid; Connors struck out. No runs.

Stars — Bolger hits to deep left field, McQuaid sends one over second, Martin pops one to Doyle at third who doubles on Bolger at second and McQuaid steals second. McCabe drives to deep centre for a two bagger scoring McCabe, Howatt swings out. One run.

Seventh Innings

Rovers — Whalen out at first by S. Ryan. McInnis drives through second, steals second and third. Cullen struck out. G. McKenzie connects for a two bagger scoring McInnis, Williams rolls one to S. Ryan out at first. 1 run.

Eighth Innings

Rovers — Diamond fouled out to McCabe. Blanchard strikes out. Doyle singles and Connors lays down to McQuaid. No runs.

Stars — S. Ryan pops out to McInnis. Bolger singles and McInnis runs, steals second and third. McQuaid out at first by Connors, while McInnis scores. Martin reaches first on an error, and steals second. McCabe shoots another long drive and scores Martin. Howatt singles and McCabe is caught at the plate on the throw in by McKenzie. 2 runs.

Ninth Innings

Rovers — Whalen swings out. McInnis draws a free ride to first, followed in like manner by Cullen. McKenzie singles and scores. McInnis, being thrown out at first by S. Ryan. Williams singles scoring Cullen, Diamond swings out, 2 runs.

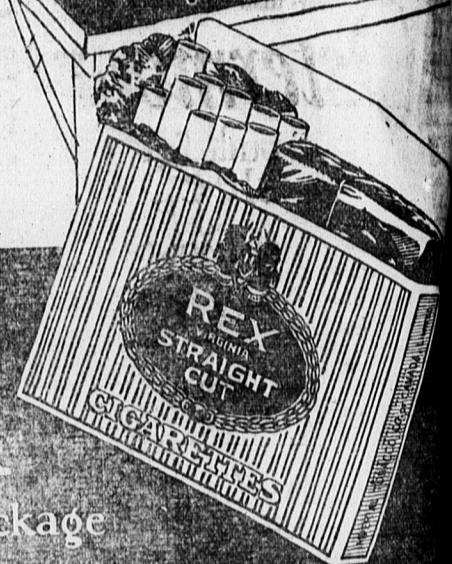
BREAKS RECORD

Owing to the pronounced weakness that developed in the Chicago market for corn and oats there was practically no demand for cash grain in the domestic market but feeling was weak and prices were again readjusted.

Prices of Argentine corn were quoted at \$1.08, and American sample corn at \$1.07 Canadian western oats were reduced one cent per bushel.
