Campbell, New Glasgow, and G. A. Sharp, Charlottetown, were the superintendents present. The time table usually changes about the first or second Sunday in June, but this year, it is stated the change may not take place until the 4th of June, on account of the G.T.R. changing on that date. It has been rumored that the number of passenger trains may be reduced from last summer, but what trains, if any, are to be taken off, is not yet known. It is said the Ocean Limited is to be continued, starting about the latter part of June, says the Moncton Times.
