Shorn for the moment of its capacity for taking an active part in the political discussions of the day, the League has nevertheless its own anxieties and doubts. Still there is a clear quickening of the faith which looks to the principles of the Covenant and the League's fortnightly publication assures the questioning world."

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## Quotes Baldwin

"In this situation, especially when every country, great or small has to put itself on guard against all imaginable dangers, the League's future cannot but be a subject of attention and even concern. Nevertheless, if the history of the League shows that, to quote the recent words of Earl Baldwin: 'Unless mankind is forever to be subject to the law of the jungle, we shall have to come back to the Covenant or something like it again and again.'

"Lord Baldwin himself may be called in testimony to the fact that the League of Nations is not dead, but that the efficiency of the League itself, to which he made pointed reference in the address already cited."

## Mighty Niagara To Be Viewed By Royal Couple

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., June 2.—The royal couple will view the world's most powerful waterfall from the falls' scenic tunnel under the falls' cliffs.

They will be the first reigning British sovereigns to look at the turbulent Niagara River's 160-foot drop, but not the first members of the royal family. Like King Edward VII and King Edward VIII, when each was Prince of Wales, King George and Queen Elizabeth will enter the United States from this city.

## Axis Envoys Smile After Hearing Molotov Speech

MOSCOW, June 1.—(AP)—Foreign diplomats today attempted to estimate the effect on the European situation of Premier Molotov's speech in which he proposed a mutual assistance pact. Molotov said the proposals did not go far enough because certain Baltic states were not specifically guaranteed against aggression.

The British ambassador, Sir William Seeds, called on the vice-commissioner for foreign affairs, Vladimir Potemkin, but it was said his visit was "unrelated to the Anglo-French proposals."

Soviet Russia's formal reply has not been delivered yet although Molotov informally turned down the proposals yesterday in his speech to the Supreme Soviet, Russian parliament.

Diplomats commented on the fact that neither the British nor French ambassador was present to hear Molotov's speech.

The German and Italian envoys, Count Friedrich Von Der Schulenburg and Augusto Rosso, were

there and left the Kremlin arm-in-arm smiling broadly. British circles said the British and French ambassadors had been detained by engagements elsewhere.

Molotov's reference to the "quarrel" Munich accord, in which Britain and France agreed to the first partition of Czechoslovakia, was contrasted with his statement that "it is not out of the question" for Russian-German trade negotiations to be resumed and that a satisfactory Italian-Soviet trade agreement had been concluded.
