### Farm Notes

#### RASPBERRY CROP LATE BUT QUALITY WILL BE HIGH

Although the season is from ten days to two weeks later than last year, this season's raspberry crop promises to be well up to average in volume. Reports received by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa indicate that the acreage is approximately five per cent greater than in 1931, and comes in practically all districts came through the winter well, with scarcely any sign of injury.

In the Maritimes, the season is about ten days late and the acreage remains the same as last year. In Quebec, there is an increase in raspberry acreage and, as the canes are in excellent condition, a corresponding increase in production can be looked for. Eastern Ontario expects a sixteen per cent increase in production this year and in the western section of the Province acreage has increased by seven per cent. Except in the Burlington to Aldershot district, the canes are in good condition although the crop will be about a week late.

Some injury is reported in the lower mainland of British Columbia and the season here is also a few days later. Growers expect a fair crop in this province, probably 6,000 crates, as compared with 5,300 in 1931.

#### APPLE SURVEY RESUMES

A. Gosselin and S. C. Hudson, of the Dominion Agricultural Economics Branch are proceeding to Kentville, Nova Scotia, to resume from July 1, the collection of data in connection with the study of apple production. They will be joined by representatives of the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture. This is the third year in which this study has been conducted and as in the past will be carried on in Quebec and Ontario as well. In Quebec the Rural Economics Service will co-operate with the Branch in obtaining the information and in Ontario it is expected that the Agricultural Economics Department at the Ontario Agricultural College will be the co-operating agency as was the case last year.

#### USE DETERMINES VARIETY

The variety of corn to be planted under prairie conditions is apparently determined by the purpose for which it is intended to use the crop. At the Federal Experimental Station, Swift Current, Sask., it has been found that even despite the prolonged drought corn produced fair yields of fodder, and that the smaller and earlier maturing Flint varieties give higher yields of dry matter than the later maturing Dents.

Where the crop is to be used for ensilage the Flint varieties are found to be unsatisfactory because of the difficulty experienced in harvesting them with a corn binder. These varieties usually have numerous suckers, and ears borne so close to the ground that they are frequently left on the field when the crop is harvested. Northwestern Dent and Minnesota 13 are recommended as varieties especially suited for ensilage, while Gehu and Squaw are better suited for pasturing off with hogs or sheep.

## Great Britain's Proposals For Disarmament

LONDON, July 14—(Canadian Press Cable)—Great Britain officially defined her attitude towards the United States proposal for a one-third cut in world armaments today, generally welcoming the American plan but producing concrete naval armament limitation proposals in lieu of the American naval plans, which Great Britain does not think go far enough.

In a white paper read before the House of Commons by Stanley Baldwin, acting Prime Minister, the government pointed out Great Britain's world wide interests made it impracticable to reduce the number of naval units beyond a certain point.

But if there is a limit to numerical reduction, it is still possible, and highly desirable, to secure by other means a large diminution in naval armaments," Mr. Baldwin said.

He therefore proposed important reductions in the maximum size of future capital ships, aircraft carriers, cruisers and destroyers, with corresponding reductions in the maximum gun-calibres for each class.

So far as land disarmament is concerned, Great Britain has already enforced standards which more than cover the United States aims. The army has been cut from 259,000 in 1913 to 207,000 at present. Mr. Baldwin pointed out.

And in the air, Great Britain find even the better class of these condiment feeds advertised as capable of doubling egg production, a claim which, of course, is absurd. Since a large amount of money is spent annually in stimulants of this type it seemed to be highly desirable to determine the actual value of these substances. With this object in view an experiment was conducted at the Poultry Division of the Central Experimental Farm.

The conditioner used was considered to be one of the better type and, judged by its ingredients, to have been more or less scientifically compounded. Upon analysis the ingredients were found to be as stated with the exception that two ingredients making up 70 per cent of the total were not even mentioned, one of which contained the same stimulant as an ingredient definitely stated in the advertising matter not to be present in the mixture. This condiment was fed exactly according to the manufacturers' directions to two pens of birds, one upon a whole grain, skim-milk ration, and the other upon our standard basal ration. Another pen acted as control and received the standard basal ration but without the condiment feed. Mortality was quite high in all pens but somewhat higher in the condiment fed pens. Production was slightly higher in the condiment fed pens but not significantly so. On the other hand the control pen had a greater body weight to maintain from the start and in spite of this showed a gain in body weight as against a similar loss in each of the condiment pens. The efficiency of use of feed was practically the same for all pens. The net results of this test was that it appeared that there was no justification for using this product to increase egg production since feed consumption, efficiency of use of feed and egg production were not increased.

It must be borne in mind that the condiment used was one of the best on the market, consequently it might be expected that poorer results would be obtained from the bulk of such conditioners. The sale of these feeds is very large and it can be readily appreciated that much hard earned money goes to the purchase of such products with apparently no return whatever in increased efficiency of the flock. At the present time, when the margin between cost of production and returns from eggs is extremely small the expenditure of money for products of this nature is hardly justified.
