### IRELAND WILL DERIVE GREAT BENEFIT.

DUBLIN, Oct. 6.—John Heniker Heaton, M. P., the father of penny postage in a telegram to a Dublin paper, says that his joy at the establishment of penny postage with the United States is increased by the knowledge that Ireland will benefit greatly in small money orders. The sum of seven million five hundred thousand dollars was sent from the United States to Ireland last year, and this amount is likely to be increased this year. On the other hand, the United States benefits "HARVARD" AND "YALE" TRIPS.

BOSTON, Oct. 5.—Although the summer season has closed, the tide of travel on the new turbine triple-screw express steamships "Harvard" and "Yale" of the Metropolitan all the way-by-water route to New York continues as great as in midsummer. Many inquiries have been received at the offices of the company as to when this service would be resumed, and the reply in each case has been that that matter is entirely with the patrons of the line. By present indications, with full passenger lists nightly, it looks as if the service would not only be continued until the late fall but possibly through the winter months.

Notwithstanding the fact that the "Harvard" and "Yale" have made daily trips irrespective of weather conditions between the two ports, all season long, there has not been a single slip-up or mishap. The hair-spring schedule of fifteen hours between the two metropolises has been steadily maintained, and on several occasions the boats have done even better, making their berths in a trifle over fourteen hours. This, in view of the many predictions to the contrary by old sea captains and others perfectly familiar with the route, seems quite remarkable. It might be added, however, that the men in charge of the "Harvard" and "Yale" were chosen for their posts because of familiarity with the route and complete knowledge of "every inch" of the course.

The popularity of the line has been greatly accentuated by the excellent cuisine and table provided, and patrons generally are most enthusiastic in their commendations and praise of this particular branch of the service.

The sailings are daily from Boston (Olda Wharf) at 5 p. m., and from New York (Pier 45, foot of West Tenth Street) at 5 p. m., Sundays included. WINNIPEG, Oct. 6.—Passengers on the Winnipeg express from Toronto to last night state that when the train was on the way to Winnipeg, an exceedingly pretty female, who hailed from California, became rather hilarious. ### SUFFRAGETTES WILL WAGE WAR TO THE KNIFE.

LONDON, Oct. 6.—War to the knife is the promise held out by the suffragettes to the hamesomine state-smen, who everywhere meet evidences of the progress of women's work since Parliament adjourned. Open-air meetings are being held daily in the different parts of London, concluding with parades headed with banners. A demonstration is to be held in Trafalgar Square two days before the opening of Parliament on October 13. "This is the idea of our campaign," said Mrs. Flora Drummond, she noted suffragette leader, this morning: "We want to warn the government that unless woman suffrage meets with immediate attention in Parliament such a tempest will be let loose that the happenings at last session will seem distinctly like an era of peace. It is a case of war to the knife this time. We want the public to come to Trafalgar Square, not only to look on, but to help."

Mrs. Drummond added that the situation could be saved if Premier Asquith would receive their deputation and promise consideration at once of admitting women to the sacred precincts of the House.


