Miss Dunlop, of Moncton, is the guest of Mrs. Colin G. and Mr. McNeill, of the town, Ottawa. Mr. and Mrs. McNeill were residents of this city a short time ago.

At the last Quarterly Board meeting of the Church at Windsor, N.S., a very sympathetic and appropriate resolution was passed relating to the Rev. Dr. Lathern, well known in Charlottetown, who at one time was pastor of the Church, and a copy was ordered to be sent to Mrs. Lathern.

HERBERT R. VESSEY, who has been attending Wesley College, Winnipeg, arrived at his home at York Saturday evening. He will likely remain on the Island during part of the summer. Mr. Vessey says that last year over \$9,000,000 worth of buildings were erected in Winnipeg, and this city he predicts before many years will be the Chicago of Western Canada.

POSTMASTER Wheat has arranged for the transfer of mails from the Capes to Pictou and Georgetown beginning tomorrow (Wednesday). Today the P. E. I. ice boatmen are at Cape Tormentine and when they return this afternoon both crews will be at home. Mr. Wheat had wired Mr. Cullen at Sackville to send the mails through to the Cape last evening but afterwards to change to Pictou.

SATURDAY'S Sydney Post says: E. LeRoy Willis, F. A. Crowell, A. D. Ingraham, F. C. Bezanon and S. P. Chaloner canvassed a section of Charlotte street yesterday afternoon and within an hour and a half secured subscriptions amounting to \$1,300 towards a fund for a Summer Carnival and Industrial fair to be held in Sydney during the first week in August. Committees from the city council, fire brigade and board of trade will meet, on a date to be selected in next week, to arrange other details connected with the carnival.

In conversation with Postmaster Wheat yesterday The Guardian was informed that the story of a cargo of mails being left on the ice between Pictou and Georgetown and drifting out to sea is so far as he knows without foundation. It apparently had arisen from the fact that at the first trip of the Stanley to the ice barrier the Minto had sent over to the other side of the barrier the large mail laid up at Pictou for some time. The Stanley did not wait to complete the transfer and the cargo was left all night on the ice, it being thought that the Stanley would return next day. She was delayed in the Straits for a week however and some imaginative traveller probably got the idea that the barrier had floated away in the meantime. As a matter of fact the huge were a second time put on board the Minto and subsequently sent to Charlottetown, being the first of the old newspapers, etc., from Pictou to arrive here.

OBITUARY—Died at Dundas on the 14th Feb 1905, Ernest McSwain, eldest son of Norman McSwain in the 22nd year of his age. Despite tender nursing, and all that the best medical skill could accomplish he succumbed to the inevitable and passed away wholly trusting in the merits of his Redeemer. Turpin will leave on the Dominion on April 2 for England to arrange for and take charge of the large party of immigrants which the army will bring to Canada next month.
