## Americans Hand 2-1 Setback To Rangers; Shibicky's Shoulder Hurt

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (AP)—New York Americans climbed out of the National Hockey League cellar tonight with a 2-1 victory over New York Rangers before 9,274 fans at Madison Square Garden. The triumph put the Americans in a fourth-place tie with Boston.

It was the third straight loss for Rangers and the Stanley Cup holders suffered a further severe blow through an injury to Alex Shibicky, clever left winger, who was taken to hospital to be x-rayed for a possible break in his right shoulder. Shibicky, hurt in a mix-up along the boards at the end of the second period, said he did not know who had topped him.

The Rangers lost defenceman Art Coulter last week when he tore muscles in his shoulder.

Cloze-in shots by Murray Armstrong and Harvey Jackson, American veterans, accounted for the winning goals in the third period. Pat Egan, Amerik defenceman, got assists on both entries.

The Rangers tallied in the second period when Phil Watson, poked in a pass from Bryan Hextall. Lester Patrick's boys were awarded the first penalty shot of the year here but Alf Pike's drive punted harmlessly into Earl Robertson's pads. The shot was given because an American grabbed the puck in the crease.

## Texas A. and M. Loses Rose Bowl Chance 7-0

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 28 (AP)—Mighty Texas A. and M. came to the end of its rope today—strangled by an ancient jinx and a magnificent football team.

One fierce thrust in the first 57 seconds of play by their 46-year-old traditional rivals, the University of Texas, bagged a touchdown, wrecked the Rose Bowl-bound Cadets and paralyzed 45,000 fans. The final score was 7-0.

It was Texas' football game from that first bold surge engineered by Peter John Layden. Only once did the Aggies threaten to pick up the thread of their great winning streak that had stretched to 19 consecutive games. That was on a magnificent one-man riot by John Aleo Kimbrough, all-America full-back. He went 63 yards downfield on nine carries but the lone Aggie scare petered out on the Texas 12-yard line.

The jinx has prevented a Cadet eleven from winning in Austin since 1922 and allowed it to win only three times in 46 years. It cost the Aggies a Rose Bowl invitation and may cost them an undisputed Southwest conference title.

## Conn, Savold Tangle in 12 Rounds or less

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (AP)—Looking ahead to the one "big shot" against Joe Louis next summer, Billy Conn, the ambitious Pittsburgher, and Lee Savold from Iowa tangle tomorrow night in Madison Square Garden for 12 rounds or less.

With the supply of available heavyweight challenging material rapidly dwindling to the point where there doesn't seem to be enough around to meet Louis' demands through 1941, the winner tomorrow is almost a cinch to meet up with the Brown Bomber next year.

Promotor Mike Jacobs has long had a desire to put the Pittsburgher in there with the Bomber when he grows up to that size. Conn still is able to make the light-heavyweight limit, but in recent months he has put on a pound here and another there so that he may conceivably be a half to a ton in with the big fellow next summer without the authorities intervening.

Like Conn, Savold is a "p.cure" fighter who attracts the customers. This is evidenced by the fact that Promoter Mike Jacobs expects some 14,000 to 15,000 fans on hand tomorrow night, compiling a gross gate of about \$35,000, which is not to be sneezed at these days.

## Williams and McKinnon score in Victoria win

GLACE BAY, N.S., Nov. 28 (AP)—North Sydney Victoria tonight set back Glace Bay Miners 3-2 to advance to within two points of Miners, leaders in the Cape Breton Hockey League. The win broke a second-place tie with Sydney, dumping the Millers into the league cellar for the first time in two years.

Frank Clifton of Kebeora, Ont., broke a 2-2 tie in the last period with the winning goal. Ab McKinnon and Tic Williams, both of Charlottetown, had got one apiece for Vics previously.

Playing coach Jo-Jo Grabeski scored one of Miners' goals and set up the other for Ab Conck.

## Don Lash Retains title

DETROIT, Nov. 28 (AP)—Don Lash won the National Amateur Athletic Union 10,000-meter run for the seventh successive time today, racing over a snow-covered course to beat Greg Rice, former Notre Dame runner, by 250 yards.

Luigi Beaul, of New York Athletic Club, was third, and Tom Quinn, Michigan Normal School, fourth. The time was announced unofficially at 30:24.

Lash, former Indiana University distance star, who competed unattached, and Rice led the field virtually the entire distance.

BERWICK, Pa., Nov. 28 (AP)—Elison (Tazian) Brown, Westley, R.L., won the 31st annual Berwick Marathon over a snow-covered 9 1/2-mile course today in 59:35. Leslie Dawson, Pawtucket, R.I., finished 15 yards behind the leader.

## Reduced Fares for Holiday Season

MONTREAL, Nov. 28—To enable people to travel during Christmas and New Year's, reduced fares will be in effect over Canadian railway lines between all points in Canada, according to the passenger traffic managers of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific railways.

During the Christmas season, round trip fares will consist of one way fare and one-quarter, these being good for travel on Monday, December 28 to and including Wednesday, December 29, with the return movement good to leave destination up to midnight of Thursday, Dec. 28. For New Year's tickets will be good at above rates, going Dec. 30 to and including Wednesday, Jan. 1, with the return movement from Thursday, January 2. For the combined Christmas and New Year's holidays, there will be one-way fare and one-third for the round trip during the extended period from Friday, Dec. 29, to and including Wednesday, Jan. 1, with a liberal allowance for the return movement good up to Tuesday, Jan. 7. During the school vacation of this festive season round trip fares for teachers and pupils may be purchased on presentation of certificate for travel to and from their homes. These fares will consist of one way fare and one quarter for the round trip, good from Friday, Nov. 25 to and including Wednesday, Jan. 1, with the return movement good up to midnight of Friday, Jan. 31, thus providing an opportunity for a vacation up to two months.
