O'Leary SPECIAL PASSION WEEK SERVICES

For the first time in many years the O'Leary pastoral charge of the United Church of Canada Passion Week services were held at each appointment. The services were very largely attended and were impressive and instructive.

The address of each evening was given by the Minister, Rev. W. G. Dickson. The service on Monday, March 22nd was held in the century old West Devon United Church and despite the heavy snowstorm of that day there was a fine turnout. On Tuesday, March 23rd the service was held in the Bloomfield United Church and the opening worship was conducted by the Young Peoples Union with the President, Mrs. Errol Stetson presiding. The Scripture was read by Mrs. Alban Craswell. On Wednesday night, March 24th the service was held in the Brae United Church and despite treacherous roads which made driving by sleighs dangerous as the horses tended to sink in the soft snow, there was a splendid congregation. On Thursday night, March 25th the service was held in the O'Leary United Church and was under the auspices of the Young Peoples Union. The opening devotions were in charge of the President, Miss Jean Kennedy who was assisted by Miss Shirley Gorrill. A duet was sung by Mrs. Lewis Bernard and Miss Jean Kennedy which was greatly enjoyed. The sermon text was "We Preach Christ Crucified" and was interesting and instructive. Sport Echoes

from Prince County

In the final game for the championship of the North Shore League the games of which are all played in the Kensington rink, the Kensington Legion defeated New Annan after exactly one hour of overtime play. After regulation play the teams were tied so they were given ten minutes rest and then went into overtime changing ends at the end of each ten minute period. We think it quite possible that this constitutes a record for the length of overtime play in Prince Edward Island, but if anyone who knows of a longer overtime session we'd be very glad to hear about it.

The victory of the Kensington Legion was a bit unexpected because New Annan had led the North Shore League all season and looked the class of the circuit. The Kensington Vets came into the line with their strong finishing drive this spring. The sudden improvement in the team was due in part to the fact that Don Baker, veteran goaler with a brilliant record of achievement behind him was persuaded to put on the Leg on sextet. Report has it that Don was a bit shaky during the first game but rapidly regained his old cunning between the pipes and was one of the chief stumbling blocks in the way of New Annan's winning the championship.

The bullet drives of Jabez "Chubby" Mill would certainly have no terrors for Don, for he has memories of some of the world's best marksmen taking pot shots at him at the rate of about four or five to the minute one hectic night in Toronto. Reggie Hamilton, Pop Kelly, Art Jackson and Nick Metz were among the snipers who directed rubber at the citadel that Don was guarding that night. More than a dozen disks eluded him but that was a pretty small percentage of the sum total of rubber that came his way and Don earned the plaudits of the fans, the sportswriters and the play-by-play announcer. The occasion was when St. Michaels College defeated the Charlottetown Abbies in the Eastern finals for the Memorial Cup. This was quite a few years ago and of the stars on the St. Michaels team that night only Nick Metz has survived the baleful influence of Father Time to remain a Big Time hockey. Metz scored the winning goal in the first play-off game between the Maple Leafs and Boston last week. It is probable that Nick Metz and Don Baker are the only survivors of all the boys who played in that series, though some of the others may still be playing. Yes, so says us Tic Williams who played for the Picton Mariphas this season was a member of the Abbies of that year.

Summerside High School and West Kent School of Charlottetown will meet at the Charlottetown Forum Wednesday night in a sudden-death game to decide the interscholastic championship of Prince Edward Island. The teams are evenly matched and a stirring struggle is expected.

Retired Keeper Of Lighthouse To Be Honored

An interesting ceremony will take place today at the regular meeting of the Summerside Rotary Club when Mr. Thomas Ranahan, retired keeper of the Sea Cow Head lighthouse will be presented with the meritorious service medal. The presentation will be made by Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., representing the Minister of Transport, the Hon. Lionel Chevrier. Mr. Ranahan retired from his position in November, 1946, after 28 years of looking after the lighthouse in which he himself had been born. His father, the late Peter Ranahan had kept that lighthouse for 45 years and until a year after his death and until the birth of the keeper and his family lived in the lighthouse. At that time the Government built a residence for the keeper and his family.

Mr. Ranahan recalls that during the 28 years he served in this responsible position he arose from his bed every hour of every night to see that the light was working. Each time that he got up he would set his alarm clock for one hour later and when it sounded he would again get up and repeat the performance. Although the lighthouse was constructed in 1864, mainly to save shipping of the dangerous Miscouche shoals two miles away, its importance was greatly increased in 1916 when the Car Ferry commenced to ply between Borden and Tormentine and in that year for the first time in its history the light remained on all winter. With the opening of the Air Force station at Summerside during the war, its importance again greatly increased as aircrews used its light as a navigational aid. The present keeper is Mr. Walter Richards.—S.
