JAPAN NOW ADMITS FORMER LOSSES

One Battleship, One Cruiser, Two Gunboats and Two Destroyers Sunk by Mines Before Port Arthur—Russian Admiral Volkersham Dead.

NAGASAKI, June 1.—(Special.)—The Russian torpedo boats from Vladivostok captured the Japanese steamer Daisben of 700 tons off Hokkaido and placed a prize crew of thirteen men on board with orders to take the vessel to port.

By a mistake the Russian commander of the Daisben headed for Gensan, Korea, and met a Japanese transport. The latter seeing the Russian flag flying from the Daisben attempted to recapture the vessel, when the Japanese captives aboard the steamer on seeing their compatriots, attacked the prize crew, recaptured the vessel and eventually took her to Gensan.

BLOW AT THE HEART

As the details come in of the great battle in the Straits of Corea, it becomes evident that the naval power of Russia was utterly destroyed during the three days of running fighting. Every one of Rojestvensky's fourteen armored ships has been accounted for. Here is the list:—

Alexander III. (s.k.). Nicholas I. (cap'd).

It must be remembered that all the light cruisers, torpedo boats, destroyers, store-ships and colliers that accompanied Rojestvensky's fleet were merely intended to provide the necessary scouting and refueling services for these fourteen fighting vessels. The protected cruisers and torpedo ships without their armored consorts are like sheep without a shepherd.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—(Special.)—The State Department has received a despatch from Minister Griscum at Tokio stating that it has been officially announced that Admiral Volkersham was killed and not captured as previously reported by the department.

TRIBAL FIGHT IN INDIA.

PESHAWAR, British India, May 20.—The rebel brother of the Nawab of Dir has escaped from Peshawar and has raised an army beyond the frontier. A British column at Nowsharra, Shide, has been ordered to prepare for eventualities.

MONTREAL, May 30.—R. H. Pope, for many years cattle inspector at this port, has been appointed right of way agent for the Grand Trunk Pacific with headquarters at Fort William.

HABEAS CORPUS CASE.—Yesterday morning the prisoner, James McNeill, in Queen's County Jail, for whose release application was made a few days ago by J. J. Johnston was by order of Mr. Justice Fitzgerald released from prison. The prisoner, who belongs to Park Corner, had been sent up to the Supreme Court for trial by Richard Ready and William Campbell, J. P.'s for Queen's County. The commitment was in the form prescribed for the arrest of a person already indicted for a crime. The Magistrates were cited before the Judge but were unable to disclose that any indictable offence had been committed by the prisoner who was therefore discharged.

THE sad news was received yesterday by Dr. Conroy of the death of Mrs. George Conroy, Cleveland, Ohio, sister of Mrs. (Dr.) Conroy, after an illness of only about a month. The death is made doubly sad by the demise of her little daughter in this city a little over a year ago. The deceased was the youngest daughter of the late John Fenton Newbery, Esquire, and a sister of Mrs. Sullivan, Mrs. Conroy, Mrs. Fraser and Madame Newbery (in Halifax) and of E. T. Newbery, Walter Newbery, William Newbery, and Arthur Newbery. About eight years ago she went with her husband to Cleveland, Ohio, whence her remains will at once be brought for interment here. To be remembered ones the sympathy of many friends will go out.

The hospital is so crowded with immigrants undergoing treatment for trachoma that beds have been placed on the grounds to accommodate the overflow.
