In Memoriam

MISS EVELYN HARRISON WINDSOR

The lamented death of Miss Evelyn Harrison Windsor, occurred Wednesday night in the Prince Edward Island Hospital. She entered this institution about a month ago, and up until three weeks before that, Miss Windsor appeared to be in her usual good health and was attending to her duties daily.

She was born at New Mills, New Brunswick, and was in the 23rd year of her age. Her father was the late Joseph Windsor, who at one time was a prominent merchant of that place; he passed away about twenty years ago. Her mother is Eliza Bertram Lea, and after the death of Mr. Windsor, Mrs. Windsor with her family removed to her native place at Grapaud. There they resided until some eight or ten years ago, when they decided to permanently locate in Charlottetown.

The late Miss Windsor was a graduate of Prince of Wales College, and also of Mount Allison Ladies College in Sackville, where she specialized in Domestic Science. After leaving college she was appointed Assistant Supervisor of the Women's Institutes of Prince Edward Island. Subsequently she resigned this position and was appointed instructor in Domestic Science in the MacDonald Ladies College at Sherbrooke, Quebec. Last autumn she accepted the important position of Supervisor of the Women's Institutes of this Province and returned to the Island.

In her official position for which she was so admirably qualified, Miss Windsor came in contact with many people throughout the whole Province. Of a naturally bright nature and friendly disposition, socially she was well liked by all who knew her. Added to other qualities she was very attractive, and this together with an engaging and magnetic personality endeared her to her intimate friends and won for her the respect and admiration of all.

It is seldom in this community that a bright young life with the thought of many years of usefulness before her, is extinguished by the hand of death. On the very threshold of her womanhood she has been called to the Better Land; and during her brief life she had set a worthy example and left her mark of excellent endeavor upon the community in which she lived and labored.

Miss Windsor belonged to the Trinity United Church, and was a member of the choir and also the Willing Circle of King's Daughters. There are left to cherish her memory a bereaved mother and two brothers, Vincent at home and Ralph in California.

The Honorable Walter M. Lea is an uncle. To those in sorrow the Guardian extends sincere sympathy.

Monthly Meeting Of The I. O. D. E.

Regular monthly meeting Royal Edward Chapter I. O. D. E. was held Monday afternoon, March 29, in the rooms of the Chapter in Navy League Building, Regent Mrs. J. E. B. Macdonald presiding, and a large number of members present. Two new members, Mrs. T. C. Edgett and Mrs. H. C. Brown were enrolled.

An acknowledgment was read from an acknowledgment was read from the annual Sec'y's office of a substantial contribution from this chapter to the work of the Navy League in our own province, stating that this contribution was part of a total subscription of \$1973.50 made by I. O. D. E. to work of Navy League in Canada. Contribution was also voted to League of Nations. Letters of gratitude and thanks were read from five soldier settler families whom it had been our privilege to help during the past two months.

The possibility of the members being able to avail themselves of use of McGill Circulating Library was discussed. Regent reminded the Chapter that now was the time to take definite steps about a Public Library, as the general public appeared to be waiting for someone to start. After discussion a motion was passed to the effect that the Regent be appointed a Committee to draw up a petition to be presented to the Mayor and Council asking that use of the Market Building be given the people as a Public Library, Museum, and Community Center, and that this Committee arrange for the signatures of the Executive of all organizations in the City.

The Secretary reported the substance of business brought before the Executive at meeting of March 23rd, which included a report from Mrs. Mathieson of the meeting to arrange of Amateur "Shopping Week" and a report from Mrs. Brauhut of the Social Welfare Meeting. At this latter meeting, the Regent had been appointed a member of a general committee to arrange for a Social Welfare Conference in May where speakers of national importance will be heard, the Social Welfare Council assuming all financial obligations.

Regent reading from the minutes of the National Executive, referred to remarks of British Trade Commissioner re British films, the success of Miss Jennie Turner in the Christmas Card Competition, and the annual meeting of the National Council in Trinity College, Toronto, the last week in May. Reference was also made to the tours of 1000 British lads and 25 British school-girls to Canada this summer, the Daughters of the Empire being expected to assist in the furtherance of plans of these tours.

The resolution of Miss Hunt, Abegweit Chapter, S.S.D.E., re the observance of Thanksgiving Day as apart from the last week in May, was ratified by the Chapter. A decision was made that work be planned by sewing committee and delivered to members; to be brought in finished when sewings resume in September to make ready for sale on Trafalgar Day. Meeting adjourned in regular way.

Island Student Is Elected President Of Debating Society

Socials Debating Society of Dalhousie University held its final meeting of the year yesterday afternoon in the Forrest Building, when several items of business were discussed and officers were elected for the year 1928-29. Rod H. MacLeod, retiring president, was in the chair. After the minutes had been read by J. J. Atwood, retiring secretary-treasurer, Mr. MacLeod mentioned the Canadian debating tour which the Maritime Proving team had undertaken this winter, when Ernest M. House had represented Dalhousie, and stated that it was the intention of the National Federation of Canadian University Students, of which Dalhousie is a member, to send a western team East next year. It was moved and seconded that Dalhousie should entertain the Western University team during their Maritime tour.

The personnel of the intercollegiate team committee for next year was also named, one vacancy being caused by the resignation of Prof. Angus L. Macdonald, of the Law School. The following committee was named: Dean John E. Read (re-elected), Dr. Geo. E. Wilson (re-elected), Prof. C. H. Mercer, Prof. Horace E. Read and Rev. Dr. John Line, of Pine Hill.

Morris B. MacKinnon, B.A., of Charlottetown, P.E.I., was elected to the office of president for the coming year. Mr. MacKinnon is a graduate of King's Collegiate School, Windsor, where he was prominent in debating and captain of the hockey team, and last spring graduated from Bishop's College, Lennoxville, Quebec, where he was twice hockey captain, prominent as a debater, and editor-in-chief of the "Mitre."

This past year he has been a member of the executive of the Law Society and the faculty football and hockey teams, and several weeks ago spoke in the trials for the University debating teams. He is in first year Law, and has been elected a member of the D.A.A.C. executive for the coming year.

Miss Helen G. Williams, of Moncton, N.B., was chosen to fill the office of vice-president. Miss Williams is a popular member of Arts '31 and will appear in several weeks in the convocation play, "The Show-Off," in which she is leading lady.

Thomas H. Coffin, B.A., of Halifax, was elected to the position of secretary-treasurer. Mr. Coffin is in second year Law, and a last year's graduate in Arts from Dalhousie.—Halifax Chronicle.

WINTERING SURPLUS QUEENS AND WHY.

(Experimental Farms Note.)

In the fall there will be found in most of the colonies a few queens that are considered too weak for safe wintering and these are generally united to make one strong colony in place of two or more weak ones. The usual method of uniting, however, results in the loss of many good queens that might be of great value in the following spring. For the past five or six years the Bee Division of the Dominion Experimental Farms has been very successful in uniting weak colonies as follows:—During the latter end of September or early in October half the combs are removed from each weak colony. In the centre of half these united colonies is placed a tight fitting division board so that the combs and bees of the colony are on one side of it. The combs and bees from the other colonies are then brought over and placed on the opposite side of the division so that there are now two weak colonies in one hive but completely separated from each other. A block of wood is placed in the entrance of the hive so that it provides two small entrances, one at each corner of the front. This block should be pushed in so that it will touch the front edge of the division board. Late swarms, nuclei or bees from other colonies can be brought together in this manner and will winter safely in cellar or packing case.

In the spring these extra queens are very useful to replace drone laying or failing queens or to requeen colonies that became queenless during the winter. It is often difficult to obtain queens in the early spring add in any case much valuable time is lost in brood rearing and a few surplus queens in the apiary at this time will often turn useless colonies into honey producers.
