Reduction In Wheat Crop

OTTAWA, Nov. 13—The Dominion Bureau of Statistics today estimated Canada's 1935 wheat crop at 273,971,000 bushels, about 2,000,000 bushels less than that of 1934.

The crop report containing the second estimate of the wheat yield brought production down from a Sept. 11 estimate of 290,541,000 bushels to place it slightly below the 1934 yield while estimated yields of most other cereal crops were higher than those of last year.

The report said the 1935 season was similar to that of 1934 in that threatening returns did not fully substantiate first estimates of grain production.

Altar Intact When Church Caves In

PLYMOUTH, Montserrat, Nov. 13—R. H. Johnson, Manager of the Royal Bank of Canada, and his family were forced to move into their servants quarters after a series of earthquakes which began Sunday and were still rocking this "Emerald Isle of the Caribbean" tonight.

The banker's home was badly damaged by the first and most severe shocks. The dwelling their servants once used is a small, three-room hut.

St. Peter's Anglican Church and the school house here were ruined, and the Church of England rectory was damaged. One of the strangest incidents of the tremblings was that the Altar of St. Peter's was left intact when the roof of the church caved in.

The earth tremblings have continued since Sunday at frequent intervals. Though numerous, the tremors are light but long, interspersed occasionally by heavy vertical shocks.

RECEIVES D.D. FROM ACADIA

Dr. H. M. Tory Receives Degree At Special Founder's Day Convention.

WOLFVILLE, N. S., Nov. 13—The theory that too much education had been one cause of the depression was termed "false" and "stupid" today by Dr. H. M. Tory, former president of the National Research Council of Canada, in receiving an honorary degree of doctor in civil law from Acadia University here at a special Founder's Day convocation.

"As people rise in intelligence," he said, "so rises the state." He declared modern science had created far more jobs than it had destroyed and the very future of Canada lay in the hands of the educated men.

Dr. Tory was born in Guysboro, N. S., and received his early education there. Graduating from McGill University in 1900 with a gold medal in mathematics and physics, he continued his studies and helped organize the University of Alberta, becoming its first president in 1908 and holding that position for a quarter-century.

During the World War, Dr. Tory held the rank of colonel and was director of educational services for the Canadian overseas forces and member of the imperial education committee. In 1926 he was a special commissioner for the Canadian government to the pan-Pacific Science Congress in Japan. Becoming president of the National Research Council of Canada and director of national research in 1928, he was responsible for the organization and building of the national research laboratories at Ottawa.

Since 1929 he has been president of the League of Nations Society in Canada and headed a royal commission in 1930 investigating the Canadian apple industry.

Publisher of many papers on scientific, educational, governmental and agricultural subjects, he was greatly responsible in the founding of the Canadian Journal of Research published by the Research Council.

Dr. Tory holds honorary degrees from St. Francis Xavier University, McGill, University of Toronto, University of Saskatchewan and University of Alberta.

Monthly Meeting Of Children's Aid Society

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Management of the Children's Aid Society of Prince County was held Tuesday evening in the Town Hall. In the absence of the President Mr. Heath Strong, K. C., presided.

Rev. Mr. Waterworth strongly advocated the bringing into force of the Curfew By-Law, and stated that delinquency appeared to be on the increase in Summerside, and other Towns in the Maritimes were ringing the Curfew Bell and this should be done here, and the Secretary was instructed to request the Council that the Curfew Law be instituted.

Mr. V. J. Harrington, the Truant Officer and Agent of the Society, in a lengthy report dealt with the delinquency among children in the Town, and he stated that all his time and a good portion of the time of the Town Police was used up in trying to overcome the delinquency among the children. There seemed to be an epidemic of small thefts in the Town this fall among the juveniles. As far as truancy is concerned he stated the matter was well in hand, as he only had the children of three families which gave him great trouble. He advocated the amendment of the School Act so that Truant Officers might institute actions against parents who refused to send their children to school. At the present time this can only be done by the School Inspectors.

The annual meeting of the Society was adjourned till December owing to the unavoidable absence of the President.

FISHermen IN BATTLE WITH WHALES

Narrow Escape For Trio In Bay Of Chaleur.

TORONTO, N. B., Nov. 13—A vicious attack by five whales while a sixth, entangled in the anchor cable, threatened to pull their 25-foot boat beneath the surface of Bay Chaleur is described by James Daley and two other fishermen of this community.

After the men anchored and threw out a line the boat began jerking from side to side as the bow lowered. The water seethed when five whales, estimated by Daley to measure between 40 and 50 feet in length, came to the surface.

"One after another those fellows began charging the boat, and kept at it for about an hour," he said. "As soon as they got close to us they dived under several times I could have touched them with an oar. Quite often their backs just scraped our keel as they went underneath. They were going so fast, that when they came up on the other side and turned to come at us again they skidded right over on their sides. Several times their tails came within a foot of smashing the boat. What with their splashing and blowing they pretty near drowned us.

"They were coming closer each time they charged, and I knew that it would only be a matter of time before they would strike the boat. I decided to cut the cable, and we got up to the bow. Right then was about eight inches above water level.

"We gripped the cable to pull it around the side to get at it to cut it, when we felt something slide off, and the bow came up with a jerk. The five whales charged once or twice more, and then disappeared. It was the toughest spot I was ever in in all my 30 years fishing."

A seventh whale much larger than the others appeared farther from the boat but did not join in the attack, said Daley.

Other fishermen said such an attack was very rare, but most admitted they wouldn't care to arouse the monsters' anger.

BANK SYNDICATE AWARDED N.S. LOAN ISSUE

HALIFAX, Nov. 13—The tender of the Bank of Montreal, manager of a syndicate of 11 Canadian Banks and investment companies, for an issue of \$7,000,000 Province of Nova Scotia bonds was accepted today by Premier Macdonald, Provincial Secretary.

For \$3,000,000 for five years at 2 1/2 per cent, the price paid was \$9,811, and for the remaining \$4,000,000 for 12 years at three per cent the price paid was \$6,611.

The proceeds are to be used for construction of the new provincial office building, highway expenditures and general purpose of the province.

Air Officials Sail For Canada For Conference

(C.P. Cable By Guardian's Special Wire)

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 13—It's too early to predict when the service will start but, providing negotiations are successful, it will be inaugurated as soon as possible," declared Sir Donald Banks just before he sailed today, enroute to confer with Canadian authorities on a regular trans-Atlantic air service.

FISHermen IN BATTLE WITH WHALES

Narrow Escape For Trio In Bay Of Chaleur.

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)

TORONTO, N. B., Nov. 13—A vicious attack by five whales while a sixth, entangled in the anchor cable, threatened to pull their 25-foot boat beneath the surface of Bay Chaleur is described by James Daley and two other fishermen of this community.

After the men anchored and threw out a line the boat began jerking from side to side as the bow lowered. The water seethed when five whales, estimated by Daley to measure between 40 and 50 feet in length, came to the surface.

"One after another those fellows began charging the boat, and kept at it for about an hour," he said. "As soon as they got close to us they dived under several times I could have touched them with an oar. Quite often their backs just scraped our keel as they went underneath. They were going so fast, that when they came up on the other side and turned to come at us again they skidded right over on their sides. Several times their tails came within a foot of smashing the boat. What with their splashing and blowing they pretty near drowned us.

"They were coming closer each time they charged, and I knew that it would only be a matter of time before they would strike the boat. I decided to cut the cable, and we got up to the bow. Right then was about eight inches above water level.

"We gripped the cable to pull it around the side to get at it to cut it, when we felt something slide off, and the bow came up with a jerk. The five whales charged once or twice more, and then disappeared. It was the toughest spot I was ever in in all my 30 years fishing."

A seventh whale much larger than the others appeared farther from the boat but did not join in the attack, said Daley.

Other fishermen said such an attack was very rare, but most admitted they wouldn't care to arouse the monsters' anger.
