The British Soldier is a remarkably handsome horse, dark chestnut, no white except a star; a stout, strong, compactly built horse, with heavy bone and stands square on the best of feet and legs.

His trotting action is perfection; goes without boots and has better than two minute speed.

The British Soldier is sired by Cochato, 2.111-2, at 3 years winner of the Hartford Futurity 1916 (Todd's greatest speed sire-son). Todd 2.143-4 was sired by Bingen 2.061-4 founder of the greatest speed producing family in the world.

The dam of the British Soldier is the great brood mare Miss Pratt 2.17-14, by Heir-at-law 2.05-3-4, Miss Pratt is the dam of eight, including the Leading Lady 2.07 at 3 years. The Prattler is a full brother of The British Soldier. Miss Pratt is also grand dam of six with records from 2.12-1-2 to 2.05-1-2, aged 3 and 5 years.

No trotting Stallion in Canada has more speed or stronger license to produce a fast trotter than the British Soldier.

His Colts are stout, strong, sound and handsome, and show extreme speed.

The Soldier is being very liberally patronised this spring in the Stud, which may interfere with fitting him for a low record. Good judges think him capable, if properly prepared, to trot any good half mile track in 2.10.

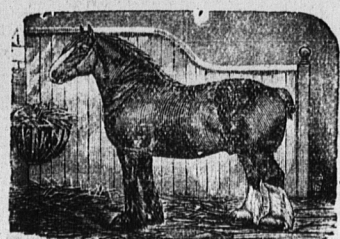

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

THE IMPORTANCE OF SELF-CONTROL (TEMPERANCE LESSON)

May 20th

(Isaiah 28:1-13.)

GOLDEN TEXT.—"Every man that striveth in the games exerciseth self-control in all things."—1 Cor. 9:25.

The prophet is speaking to the drunken leaders of Judah to warn them that the impending doom of Samaria will also be theirs if they do not cease their drunken ways. The time is the early days of Hezekiah's reign. Judah is desirous of throwing off the Assyrian yoke to which they had quietly submitted during the reign of Ahas. Isaiah warns them that their only hope is in Jehovah.

The City of Ephraim, the capital of the Northern Kingdom, is "the crown of pride" of its inhabitants, the beautiful situation crowning a hill in the centre of a fertile valley. The prophet compares its beauty to the fig which ripens before the fruit harvest in August. If anyone sees a fig ripe before the others he at once puts it in his mouth, not waiting to examine or to taste it. Like such a tasty bit was Samaria to vanish. A promise is given that Jehovah will be the stay of those who remain faithful in the 5th verse.

In the 7th verse Isaiah denounces the leaders of Judah for the same vices as controlled the Ephraimites. "No man begins at the point of being swallowed up in any evil; he approaches it almost stealthily, he touches it experimentally, he retains for a certain time his self-control in relation to it—he will handle it, but easily so that he can set it down again, should it so please him. But at the end there is the swallowing up, destruction—death is in the cup" (Joseph Parker).

Isaiah had evidently surprised the revelers at their feast, and these verses are a dialogue between them and him.

In verse 11 Isaiah tells them that the Lord will speak to them in the tongue of the foreign conqueror, that of the Assyrians, whose language was to the Judeans a strange stammering one. "God speaks twice to men, first in words, and then by deeds, but both times very simply and plainly. And if men deride and abuse the simplicity of the former, if they ignore moral and religious truths because they are elementary, and rebel against the quiet reiteration of simple voices, which God sees it best to conduct through their education, they will be punished by the commonplace pertinacity with which the effects of their insolence work themselves out in life." (George Adam Smith.)

Being a "Good Fellow." Some years ago one of the popular illustrators drew for a magazine a picture entitled "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow." It showed a clubroom, good-looking young men, whose faces were flushed with wine, stood with lifted glasses, and sang their toast to one who stood at the head of the table. He was evidently greatly gratified. He looked as if he thought it supremely worth while to have his masculine friends late in the evening, so demonstrative over his social qualities.

But there was another side to the picture. It showed the home of the "good fellow," where his young wife sat waiting for him. His house jacket was laid over a chair. His slippers stood ready before the fire. He had planned to spend the evening at home, and had not been strong enough to do it. Meanwhile the young wife had waited, watched the big clock count the hours. Now it was past midnight. It was not the first time it had happened, or the second; it would not be the last by any means.

It was not simply the disappointment, the loneliness that made the young wife lay her head on the table, sobbing. She wept, because she knew that she had married a weakling. She saw that it meant so much to him to be regarded as a "jolly good fellow" that he gave up other things infinitely greater. She had learned that his good fellowship had in it selfishness and weakness.

It is pleased to be called a "good fellow," but it is a shameful thing if we gain it through another's needless suffering, or at the cost of our own self-respect and manhood!—Yoth's Companion.

DRIED FOOD FOR WAR DIET.

Vegetables in Condensed Form Recommended for Army and Navy.

OTTAWA—A proposal has been laid before the Federal Government to supply the Army and Navy with dried vegetables, which appear to have the merit of being very light in weight. Waldron Williams, President of the Webster Products Company, has offered the Government the use of several drying plants. He advocated immediate action that summer crops might be dried for use next winter. Mr. Williams estimated that the dried vegetables would cost the Government to deliver in camps about one-third the price of fresh vegetables. He says the dried product will keep any time in any climate.

"The Department of Agriculture is authority for the statement that one-half of the fruits or vegetables grown in the United States never reach the consumer," said Mr. Williams. "A large part of this waste is in the summer. With drying stations for the evaporation of vegetables all through the farming districts, food speculation may be greatly curbed. "Nearly nine-tenths of the weight and volume of vegetables is water. Of an onion 87.6 per cent is water; of a parsnip, 83 per cent; of a potato, 78.3 per cent, and cabbages 91.5 per cent. "The problem of feeding an army

will be greatly simplified by the use of dehydrated vegetables. The German Army is now being supplied with par-boiled dried food, made by a process which makes it necessary to cook the food again. When it is remembered that the breakdown of the army transport facilities made it almost impossible for Pershing's men in Mexico to get fresh vegetables last summer, the benefit of dried vegetables to such an expedition may be easily imagined. As every square foot of space on a battleship is needed for fuel and coal, the possibilities of the new dried food for sailors are also great.
