Italian Dispute Has Been Settled

(Special to the Guardian.) PARIS, May 29.—The question of Fiume and the southern territorial boundaries of Austria has been settled by the allied council, according to the best information here this evening. An agreement also has been reached, it is said, on the general economic question except regarding economic arrangements. Thus all territorial questions will be presented to the Austrians Friday in the proposed terms.

Ex-Premier Lloyd Retires From Politics

(Special to the Guardian.) ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 29.—In the assembly yesterday former Premier Lloyd, whose cabinet resigned last week announced his intention of retiring from public life and stated he intended to accept the Registrarship of the Supreme Court at present vacant and which the incoming ministry had offered him subsequent to the recent crisis.

Fiume Becomes Independent City

(Special to the Guardian.) PARIS, May 29.—It was stated in high quarters this morning that a settlement of the Adriatic question is now a certainty, as a result of the negotiation of yesterday and last evening. Under this settlement Fiume becomes an independent city. The Italians will receive certain portions of the Dalmatian coast, but it is understood they will not get Sarea and Sebenico.

Terroism Reigns In Petrograd

(Special to The Guardian.) STOCKHOLM, May 29.—Telegrams from Wiborg, 75 miles northwest of Petrograd, quote refugees as saying that terrorism reigns in Petrograd the city being now entirely in the hands of unruly red soldiery. Street fighting continues on a murderous scale. Bolshevist leaders have posted notices that they will execute every Bourgeoisie who attempts to leave the city. An airplane passed over Petrograd dropping flyers informing the inhabitants that relieving forces were approaching.

Germans Nearly Came to Blows

(Special to the Guardian.) BERLIN, May 29.—Members of the parties of the left and right almost came to blows in the national assembly yesterday morning during a debate in the attempts to establish a separate republic in the Rhineland and the session was tumultuous. The government made a public declaration that such efforts would constitute treason punishable by life imprisonment.
