**DIED IN VICTORIA, B. C.**—Word was received yesterday by relatives in the City of the death in Vancouver, B. C. of Mr. Harry Bayfield, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Bayfield, formerly of this city and now of Vancouver. His death resulted from an operation for appendicitis. He leaves to mourn his wife and one daughter, also a sister and brother, all in British Columbia.

**ILL WITH APPENDICITIS.**—Rev. W. D. Wilson, says a St. John exchange, finally decided to cancel all appointments which he has made for the next few days as his son Bruce, has just been operated upon for appendicitis. Mr. Wilson was notified of his son's illness on Saturday afternoon, when he was in the city, and he immediately left for his home in Fredericton. His son is doing as well as can be expected.

**WON THE MILITARY CROSS.**—Lieut. Alfred Gillis of Campbellton, N. B., a brother of Mrs. (Rev.) H. J. Fraser formerly of Summerside and now of Truro, N. S., has recently been awarded the Military Cross for conspicuous bravery. Lieut. Gillis enlisted as a private at the beginning of the war, and was promoted to a Lieutenant in the field. He was wounded about two years ago and after a long furlough at home returned to the front.

**FUNERAL SERVICES.**—The funeral of Mrs. William Wayne was held from the home of her daughter, Mrs. Geo. Smith, Bungay, on Friday, Feb. 23. The service at the house and grave was conducted by the Pastor Rev. L. J. Leard. Mrs. Wayne had reached the age of 87 years. A large number of people gathered to pay their tribute of respect to the memory of a good Christian woman. She was a member of Hunter River Methodist Church. She is survived by several sons and daughters who cherish her memory.

**CONVALESCENT.**—Her many friends will be glad to learn that Miss Ruby Hacker, Summerside, who has been seriously ill in New York, of blood poisoning, is now definitely pronounced out of danger by her physicians, according to a letter received here yesterday by Miss Lucinda Shaw. **TOWN COUNCIL.**—The last regular meeting of the present Town Council was held on Monday evening, Feb. 11th. The Mayor and all the Councillors, with the exception of Mr. Clark, were present. After the passing of bills a communication from the Water & Sewerage Commissioners was read asking permission to open hydrants for the use of flushing drains and to supply water to all desiring it. He was twenty four years of age at the time. A memorial service was held in the Church at Kingston on January 13th conducted by Rev. J. Heaney who paid a high to the patriotism of heroism of the young friend and dwelt upon the debt to him and others who have made the supreme sacrifice. He also conveyed to the sorrowing parents and family the sincere sympathy of the large congregation and pointed out that while their loss was great and their sorrow deep they had reason for gratitude that their son and brother had given his life in such a noble way for so worthy a cause.
