THE BOY WOULD NOT BE DENIED TRIP TO SERBIA

Sir Thomas Lipton's steam yacht Erin has been lent to the British Red Cross Society by Sir Thomas Lipton and having already done some work in connection with hospitals in France is now carrying doctors, nurses, stores and motor cars to Serbia and Montenegro. There are on board five doctors; fifteen nurses and sisters, most of whom are voluntarily giving their services in the cause of our Near Eastern Allies; three motorists, who will drive their own cars (which are now lashed to the deck of the Erin); and six orderlies (including a motor mechanic). Captain Bennett and Miss Caldwell are in charge of the party. One of the volunteer ladies is to act as cook to the expedition. There is also on board a lady who will act as laundress to the party in Serbia and there is The Boy. He is classed as an orderly, but the nurses have made him the mascot of the party. No one seems to be quite sure how he joined the party, except himself. But join it he did. He is a public school boy aged fifteen, the son of a rector. He read in The Daily Mail that Sir Thomas Lipton was taking out the expedition in the Erin, so he presented himself at Sir Thomas' house on the Sunday before the day fixed for sailing. "I have read about your expedition in the papers," he said, "and I am fond of adventure, so I have come to ask you to take me with you." Very pleasantly Sir Thomas Lipton told him he could do nothing for him, and he must apply to the Red Cross officer in charge of the expedition. Then, having given him some tea, he sent him to London in his motor car. An hour later the boy rang him up on the telephone and asked the servant who answered if he could kindly ask Sir Thomas when and where he should bring his clothes. "But you've not been engaged," he was told. "I hope to be, though," he answered, "when I have seen the Red Cross Officer."

A day before the other members of the expedition crossed the Channel he appeared at Folkestone in his uniform of the Officers' Training Corps. The military embarkation officer saw him in the boat and told him he could not leave England without permission. "My commanding officer said I could go," he pleaded, "but didn't give me a written permit." "You cannot go," was the final word of the embarkation officer. The next day the boy was in Paris. He had carefully removed the "O.T.C." letters from his uniform and put a Red Cross band on his arm. This he purchased for two pence half-penny. Notwithstanding, he was careful to hide himself away until the ship was clear of port. Asked how he managed to get the money to travel, he said: "The governor was very decent about it, and my uncle, who is a doctor in London, persuaded my mother it would be a good thing for me." "Where is your passport?" he was asked. "Here, and he produced it from his pocket. "But you must be inoculated against typhoid fever," he was told. "I was done yesterday," he replied, "and here is the stuff for the second dose in ten days' time. A doctor in the ship can inject it."

MINING IS DESPERATE PHASE OF WARFARE IN VICINITY OF RHEIMS.

PARIS, March 16.—A subterranean struggle has been in progress for several months in the vicinity of the Alger farm, east of Rheims, says an official note which describes the operations. Sapping and counter-sapping progresses on one side or the other up to the moment mines are exploded. The advance rests with those who take the initiative. Details of the incidents connected with one of the operations are given in the note which says: "Listeners conveniently placed, established the proximity of a gallery of the enemy, and learned by their whisperings that it was occupied. The difficult operation of mining then began. Ventilators were stopped because it was feared the noise they made might attract the attention of the Germans. The candles used for illumination frequently went out for lack of oxygen. Finally the Germans became aroused to the dangers which confronted them, and soon the blows of their picks were heard. The French sappers worked faster than their adversaries, however, and exploded 650 kilograms (1,400 pounds) of lyddite, destroying the enemy's gallery and asphyxiating the Germans working there."
