COUNTING THE VOTES.

There are a number of broad differences between a Presidential election in the United States and a Canadian Parliamentary election. With us the polls open at eight o'clock in the morning and close at five in the afternoon, while in the United States the polls open at six in the morning and close at four in the afternoon. A much more remarkable difference is that in American elections the number of State and National officials to be voted for and the number of elector tickets, make the ballot a very large and cumbersome affair, with sometimes scores of names upon it. With us there are rarely more than two political parties represented on the ballot paper, and the number of candidates for whom an elector may mark his vote is usually limited to two or three.

The result is with us that the counting of votes at the close of the poll is a simple and expeditious matter, while across the border it is a slow and much more complicated affair. In the late Canadian election the result of the voting in St. John was known six or seven days within an hour after the polls closed. In Boston, in the late Presidential election, with the polls closing at four o'clock, the result

of the first precinct to be heard from was not known until three and a half hours later and it was not till six o'clock the following morning, or fourteen hours after the closing of the polls, when the last precinct in Boston was heard from. The statement of the above facts will enable our readers to partly understand why the full returns of a Presidential election are not made known with the promptness that we are accustomed to in Canada.

President Roosevelt's majority of over two millions in the popular vote of the election is the largest in the history of the country.

President Roosevelt after the election issued a statement to the effect that he would "under no circumstances" resign because a candidate or accept another nomination.

The Republicans now have good majorities in both Houses of Congress. Their majority in the Senate is now 26, a gain of 10, and in the House of Representatives their majority is now 9, an increase of 6.

It is not uncommon in Canada for a Province, Ontario, for instance, to return a majority for one political party in a federal election and a majority for the opposite party in a provincial election. Massachusetts has just given a like anomalous decision. Roosevelt, the Republican candidate for President, carried the State by a plurality of 36,290 votes, while Douglas, the Democratic candidate for Governor obtained a plurality of 35,710. At the same election the Republican secured 151 representatives to the State Legislature and the Democrats only 85.

The King and Queen of Portugal are to accompany King Edward's visit and they will be received in right royal fashion. A feature of the reception will be the naval honors. On the Life of Light the King and Queen will be met by a torpedo boat destroyer, the ship which will act as a convoy to Portmouth, where the King and Queen will be accorded full naval honors by the largest fleet of war assembled in the world since the coronation of King Edward. The Prince and Princess of Wales will welcome their Majesties on board the Victoria and Albert.

The failure of the Northumberland to bring the foreign mail over yesterday occasioned the rather general remark that after all there is something to be done to improve the summer communication from without. The day was a bad one, no doubt, and Capt. Cameron acted as he always does with considerable prudence, but were the Capes route equipped as we hope to see it yet, the short trip across the narrow strait might easily have been made both ways. It is hard to concentrate public opinion here on any great project for any considerable length of time, but this time must come when the shorter and safer route between the Island and the Mainland will again become a very lively topic.

THE VACANT PORTFOLIO.

It would seem desirable that the vacant portfolio of Commissioner of Agriculture should be filled before the election now near at hand. There are obvious reasons for this. In a Cabinet with but three departments heads a single vacancy bears the proportion of one to three. The Department was created by the party in power and declared by them to be an important one. It has now been for several months vacant. The people have a right to know who are to hold the departmental offices before being called to decide whether or not they shall extend a renewal of their confidence.

A selection made before the election will have the expense and trouble the most; follow if the choice is delayed and by-election is thus rendered necessary. Lastly, the Premier has among his colleagues who are seeking reelection a number of capable men for the position. It is therefore comparatively easy to carry out what the public interest seems to require, by filling the vacant portfolio at an early date and before the electors are called to vote.

It is announced that King Edward has passed his sixty-third year in more robust health than he has had for many years. Queen Alexandra is also now expected.
