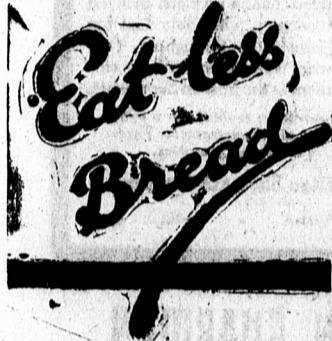

One of the young women who from what I have been told, knows nothing of auto driving, was at the wheel. They struck a bridge, culvert or some other obstacle and the result is that both young women are badly shaken up and bruised, while one of the young men is very, very near the edge of that river from which there is no return.

Now, Sir, as an automobile owner, I am interested in motor cars. I like to see them on our streets. They are a fitting symbol of the new era of progress now opening before us. As I said, I like to see them on our streets and I want everyone else to like to see them. The automobile has many enemies and such accidents as that of the other evening, gains it no new friends.

Therefore, Sir, I respectfully suggest that such accidents as the one here mentioned should be rigorously looked into, the responsibility for such accidents fixed, and the licenses or other privileges summarily taken away, and kept away until those concerned get more common sense.

Also I would suggest that the laws governing motor vehicles should be more rigorously applied "in toto" and to such a minimum, as has not yet been attained.

There is altogether too much reck-

less driving and I for one am perfectly willing to do anything to help curtail the speed of some of these reckless characters. Many of them need to be pulled up with a very sudden jerk.
