St. John Mayor Faces Problem

SAINT JOHN, Aug. 4.—(By the Canadian Press)—Legal complications loomed today as Commissioner LeBaron Wilson, at a meeting of the common council, vigorously reiterated his refusal to carry out provisions of an order-in-council under which men placed at work in the Tusker Park road project would be paid in script redeemable in food supplies. His action in disobeying the order-in-council is said to be without precedent in the history of the council and it is understood Mayor James W. Brittain is seeking advice of the City Solicitor as to what can be done to iron out the problem.

Increased Advantage To British Exporter Offered By Premier Bennett, In Tariff Preferences Involving Changes In Some Two Hundred Items.

OTTAWA, Aug. 4.—(By R. K. Carnegie, Staff Writer, The Canadian Press)—Canada proposes to alter her tariffs that her importations from Great Britain might be increased anywhere from one hundred million dollars to two hundred million dollars annually. In the statement presented by Premier R. B. Bennett to the British delegation today, the tariff changes suggested are set out item by item.

Of the eight hundred items in Canada's tariff it is understood that about two hundred of them would be changed if the proposals are accepted. In each case the object would be to give increased advantage to the British exporter as against those of foreign countries. In some items the present tariff

PROTEST RE INFLUX OF UNEMPLOYED

Manitoba Premier Appeals To Minister Of Labor To Check Eastern Movement To The West.

OTTAWA, Aug. 4.—(By the Canadian Press)—Hon. W. A. Gordon, Minister of Labor, was today considering protests received from Premier John Bracken of Manitoba, in connection with the movement of unemployed from the East to West. Premier Bracken complained that while police were making efforts to prevent the unemployed securing free rides on the east-bound freight trains, they were not molesting those bound west. He said there were enough laborers in the west to handle the harvest and the influx of more unemployed only aggravated the situation.

IS NOW 32 YEARS YOUNG

Duchess Of York Quietly Celebrated Her Birthday In London Yesterday.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—(Canadian Press Cable)—The Duchess of York very quietly celebrated her 32nd birthday in London today. Originally the Duke and Duchess intended to spend the anniversary at Glamis Castle, but the Duchess' recent indisposition altered the arrangements.

Lord Strathmore, the Duchess of York's father, is neither selling nor reported, but is closing the place, for the greater part of the year. He will be residing at Waldenbury, his Hertfordshire seat. Lord Strathmore recently stated that taxation is taking four fifths of his income.

New Falconwood Hospital Plans To Be Prepared

C. A. Fowler, Halifax, Assisted By Local Architects, Will Design New Building. Work Of Clearing Debris From Hospital Will Begin Monday.

The plans for the new Falconwood Hospital will be designed by the firm of C. A. Fowler, Halifax, and will take about three months to complete. Negotiations between the Provincial Government and Mr. Fowler were completed this week, there being a specific understanding that local architects will be associated in the work. Details of the proposed plans are not yet available, but the object will be to design an institution modern in every way, combining economy of administration with the highest possible efficiency. A contract for the preliminary work of clearing away the debris at the Falconwood Hospital site has been awarded to Mr. C. M. Fitzgerald, Georgetown, the contract price being \$2,385. The work will involve cleaning the old brick and will take seven or eight weeks to complete. Activities will commence on Monday.

Six Million Dollar Fire At Chicago

Two Building Blocks In The Industrial Area Wiped Out.

CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—Fire swept through more than two blocks of buildings on the near southwest side of Chicago's industrial area this afternoon, causing damage estimated at more than \$6,000,000. Two firemen and a spectator were injured while more than half the city's fire fighting equipment battled to keep the flames from getting out of control. The plant of the Omaha Packing Company was virtually destroyed at an estimated loss of approximately \$5,000,000. Fire officials said the conflagration was started by a dust explosion in the 10-story elevator of the Quincy elevator company at 22nd and Sencamon Streets, adjoining the south branch of the Chicago river. Damage to the elevator and its contents was placed at \$800,000. The flames also spread to the lumber yard of the W. D. Crane Company and the coal yards of the Consumers Company. At the Packing Plant, 3,000 hogs, 800 cattle and 700 sheep were burned alive in the livestock pens. Only a few minor buildings belonging to the slaughterhouse were saved.

FOUR CONVICTS KILLED AND THREEWOUNDED

Break For Freedom From Arkansas Prison Frustrated—Trusty Guard Engineered Plot.

TUCKER PRISON FARM, Ark., Aug. 4.—Four convicts, one a trusty serving as guard, were killed and three others were wounded today in a break from the stockade and in a gun battle between the besieged fugitives and officers in a field. Prison authorities blame the whole tragedy on what they termed a guard's betrayal of trust invested in him under Arkansas prison rules which permit the selection of trusted convicts to do guard duty. Archie Jones, a trusty who had won the confidence of prison authorities, is charged with leading seven fellow prisoners in the

OUTBREAKS IN GERMANY INCREASING

Cabinet Holds Meeting To Discuss Some Means By Which Reign Of Terror May Be Checked.

BERLIN, Aug. 4.—(A.P.)—The Cabinet, meeting today to discuss a means of ending the political terrorism which has resulted in 130 deaths and serious injuries to more than 1,000 persons in the 89 days of the present government decided to give the police one more chance. In the event the police fail to handle the situation, President Von Hindenburg will sign a new emergency decree ordering stiffer and swifter punishment for all political agitators found armed. Already rigid measures have been taken—and numerous others planned.—(Continued on Page 5)

U.S. WOULD LIKE PARLEY WITH BRITAIN

Southern Neighbors Anxious To Be Dealt In On Any Outcome Of Imperial Conference.

TORONTO, Aug. 5.—A special despatch from Ottawa to the Mail and Empire today said: "Communications have been exchanged between Great Britain and the United States with a view to holding a conference between the Empire and the American Republic at the conclusion of the Empire gathering here—naturally prior to the pending world economic and monetary conference at Lausanne. "That the United States would like to be thus dealt in on any outcome of this conference was learned last night on high authority. It is generally understood that at any future conference between the Empire nations and the United States, the main subject to be discussed would be tariffs. "It is thus considered that a color of right is given earlier predictions that the Empire conference now in progress here is a preliminary to a general world conference of tariffs."

Daily Trains For Exhibition Week

MONCTON, N. B., August 4.—Announcement has been made that Canadian National trains numbers 200 and 210 running between Murray Harbour and Charlottetown will be operated daily, except Sunday and Thursday during Exhibition Week, August 22nd to 28th inclusive. Liberal Senator Brought To Task By Chief Justice

Hance J. Logan Strongly Criticized In Report Of Alberta Jurist Re Gypsum Queen Inquiry. Satisfied That False Evidence Was Given.

OTTAWA, Aug. 4.—Senator Hance J. Logan, Amherst, N. S., is strongly criticized in the report of Chief Justice Harvey of Alberta in the Gypsum Queen case. Certain evidence produced on behalf of Captain Freeman Hatfield, alleged owner of the Nova Scotia vessel and who has disappeared, is found to be false. An official statement issued late today on the report reads: "Hon. Horace Harvey, Chief Justice of Alberta, under the terms of a royal commission, dated January 27th, 1932, was authorized by His Excellency the Governor General in Council to enquire into and report upon all matters relating to the alleged loss of the sailing vessel, Gypsum Queen, by enemy action on July 31st, 1915, and the payment, by the Government of Canada on March 21st, 1931, of the sum of \$71,276.72 as reparations therefor to Captain Freeman Hatfield, the alleged sole owner of said vessel.
