OHIOAGO, Dec. 13-(CP)-Wheat prices soared five cents a bushel here today, December delivery selling at \$1.02 1-4, highest for any future since October, 1937. May contracts advanced to \$1.11, closing minutes, and July 97 7-8, both up 5 cents. Wheat closed 3 7-8-4 7-8 higher. Dec 102 1-4-1.02. May 99 3-4-7-8; Corn 1 7-8-2 1-2 higher Dec 55 5-8-1-2; May 57 1-4-3-8; Oats 1 1-4-1 3-8 higher.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 13-(CP)-Buoyancy on outside markets prompted excellent buying on Winnipeg grain exchange today and boosted wheat futures prices 2 7-8 -2 3-4 cents. Values rose steadily throughout the strong session and at the close Dec wheat was quoted at 83 1-2, May 87 3-4-7-8 and July 88 3-4-7-8 cents. An advance of 2 1-8 cents was scored at Buenos Aires.

TORONTO, Dec. 13-(CP)-The stock market moved higher in expanding volume today and closed around the top of the movement. Base metal stocks added .75 to the index standing, the industrials .72 and the golds .40 while the western oils weakened .28. Volume at 536,000 shares was the heaviest since Oct. 26.

Kerr-Adison advanced to a new high at 2.25 and closed at 2.30 for a gain of 2 cents on turnover of 15,000 shares. Annon. Hard Rock, MacLeod - Cocksuit, Farnour, Coniarium, Preston, Powell and Wright Hargreaves all registered better prices and heavy traders in the cheaper list at higher prices included Cheterville, Franconer, Gold Eagle, Howey, Paymaster, Naybob, Madson, Leitch and Halcor. Lakes Shores formed a fraction. National Steel Car closed 1-2 up at 70 and fractions were added by Dominion Foundries, the Canadian Car stocks, Dominion Bridge, Steel of Canada pfd., and United Steel.

Steep Rock usurped the main attention in the base metal group, trading 29,000 shares and advancing 4 cents to 2.16. Senior issues held minor net gain in comparatively quiet trading. Calgary and Edmonton finished 10 cents down at 2.10. Home lost 6 cents. Anglo-Canadian 4 and Royalite 3-4 of point. Dalhousie firmed 5 cents.

MONTREAL, Dec. 13-(CP)-Buying power boosted stock market leads fractions to around two points in fairly active trading today. Papers showed the most gaining ability as Price Brothers preferred advanced two points, St. Lawrence Corporation preferred 1-2 and Howard Smith and Bathurst 3-8 each. In rails, Canadian Locomotive moved 1/4 point, Canadian Car common 7-8, Doco 1-2 and C. P. R. 1-4 National Steel Car lost one.

Noranda was up 1 3-4 in metal dealings while Nickel and Hudson Bay added 1-8 each, Bell Telephone climbed a point while fractional improvements were recorded for Asbestos, Dominion Tar, Hamilton Bridge and Canadian Alcohol "A." Among stocks to retreat a bit were Algoma Steel, Dominion Bridge, Foundation Company, Brillan, Shawinigan and International Pete. Total sales: 58,100 shares; Industrials 31,500; Mines, 26,600; Bonds, \$50,000.

By Frederick Gardner Associated Press Financial Writer NEW YORK, Dec. 13-(AP)-The stocks market responded belatedly to booming commodity prices today and leaders pushed ahead fractions to around 3 point in the fastest trading in more than a month. Buying orders were on hand at the opening and the steady climb continued with but few interruptions throughout. Transfers of 1,061,150 shares were far ahead of the 612,150 of yesterday. The Associated Press average of 60 representative stocks added .7 of a point at 50.9.

On the Canadian list Bell Telephone soared four points to 129 and Shawinigan fell back 1 7-8 points to 17 3-4. Fractional improvements were scored by Dome, International Nickel, Walkers, Hollinger and Imperial Oil while Ford and Lake Shore eased as much. Stocks benefitting from the boomlet included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft, Santa Fe, New York Central, Celanese, Westinghouse Electric, Du Pont, Union Carbide, Allied Chemical, U. S. Gypsum, Anaconda, American Smelting, Western Union, J. I. Case, International Harvester and Caterpillar. American Telephone nosed to a 1939 high.

War Effects Seen On Britain's Toy Front

(By Harold Fair, Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, Dec. 13-It's a great war on Britain's "toy front" which extends all the way from the pavement market on London's Holborn Street to the lavish displays in the big stores. Manufacturers report export orders far greater than last year. Walter Lines, president of the British Toy Manufacturers' Association, said the first Great War "did a great deal to establish Britain's toy industry at the expense of Germany and now the British blockade is helping history repeat itself." The toy-makers have done everything but put Santa Claus in uniform. One of the largest doll manufacturers dressed the entire production in the uniform of women's services while others replaced

the time-honored red Indian outfit with uniforms of famous regiments or militia battle dress. Every kind of toy shows the war influence. For small boys there are clockwork balloon barges, miniature Bren gun carriers and tanks. Christmas with a complete version of the Maginot line, equipped with pillus and artillery. Carr wrote: "I saw, with horror, in one of the newspapers that toy tanks, bombers, reproductions of the Siegfried line, and so forth are being prepared for sale as Christmas presents." The Times took that letter as the text of an editorial which said: "To give toy soldiers to children is not to induce the spirit of militarism. The spirit is there already and the more it can work itself off in the nursery the stronger the hope for the peace of the world." A certain "M. E. Jersey (dowager)" thought military toys all right because the children could gain "something of an accurate idea of what is intended by the Siegfried line and other defences destined to play a part in history."
