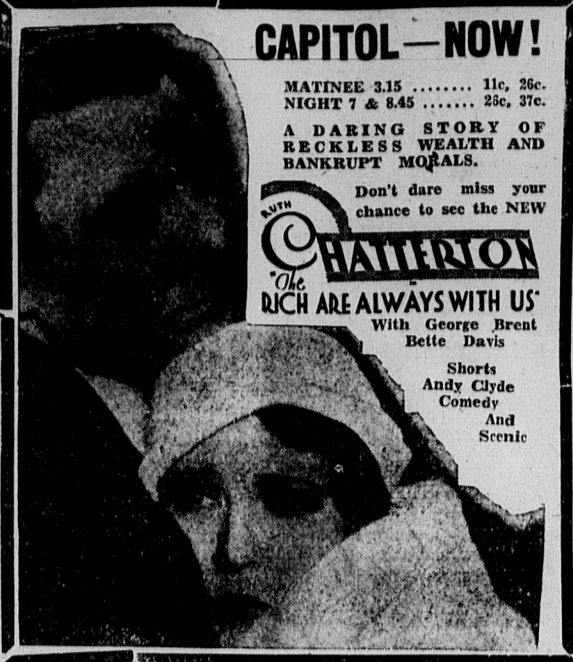

FROM FLORIDA

An interesting extract from a letter received by F. Baker, city, from his sister wintering in Florida. "This is a delightful climate. I am so thankful to be here through the cold. St. Petersburg is certainly a nice city, so clean, the streets look polished. The sun shines most all the time. Such nice trees and shrubbery. The palms and palmetto are in bloom. Such beautiful flowers and blossoms! There is plenty of fruit—oranges and grapefruit in abundance. We see a large flock of robins that arrived this morning. They are twittering and talking as if excited over their arrival. The ducks are coming in large flocks. They soar around and come down on lake or pond, keeping close together. They often cover a space of two or three acres. They are very tame when they come, you can row out and pack them up in your boat—they being too tired to offer resistance! The colored people of the South seem a happy and contented race. Some have comfortable homes and drive around in cars. They are most all in a part of the city by themselves and have their own churches, schools and colleges. Many are talented musicians. They are well treated here—not one missed a fine Christmas dinner. They ride in the cars but in seats provided for them in the rear of the car. It seems, as you look at their pleasant, happy faces, as if good had come to them out of seeming evil, for they are so much in advance of their race in Africa. We drove out to the Gulf of Mexico. You can pick up such lovely shells of all kinds and shapes. There is good fishing over there, many large trout, blue fish, tarpon, sea bass, Spanish mackerel and many others. Some one caught a baby whale last week! How's that for fishing? There are no old here—boys and girls of 80 are considered young and you would believe it if you saw them 'trip the light fantastic' too."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (A.P.)—Europe took the largest part of exports from the United States, with \$1,100,000,000 worth of goods shipped to that continent. That division of the world took exports worth \$70,267,828, and also sent the largest part of the \$104,478,836 imports with a total of \$33,841,728. The exports from the two principal British countries for November 1932 as compared with November 1931 were: United Kingdom, 1932, \$24,750,734; 1931, \$16,730,807. PRODUCE

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Jan. 8—Declines in egg and butter prices featured the produce and dairy market here last week. While receipts showed no increase, the mild weather suggested the probability of increased offerings coupled with the quiet demand caused the price of fresh eggs in cartons or less to ease one to two cents a dozen. Extras were quoted at 32 to 33 cents, firsts at 27 to 28 cents and pullets at 20 to 27 cents a dozen. Storage eggs in cartons or less were firm, extras selling at 21 1/2 to 22 cents, firsts at 19 1/2 to 20 cents and seconds at 18 1/2 to 19 cents a dozen. Last week's receipts were 3,121 cases.

Continued light demand sent no 1 flaked grass market softer down 1/2 cent. Receipts of oat 2 1/4 cents a pound. Receipts for the week were 62,000 boxes.

On the cheese market current Ontario white was quoted at 8 1/2 to 8 3/4 cents, current Ontario colored 8 1/2 to 8 3/4 cents and early Ontario make 10 1/2 to 11 cents a pound. Receipts last week were 270 boxes.
