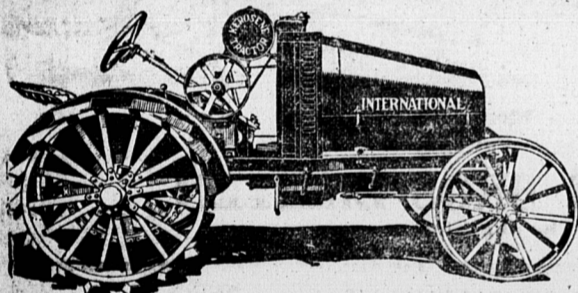

Address at Hospital Graduation Exercises

Following is the address delivered by Mr. H. T. Holman, Chairman of Trustees at the recent graduation exercises of Prince County Hospital:

Ladies and Gentlemen:
Our celebration tonight marks a very pleasing occasion in the life of our hospital. We are graduating three nurses and thus demonstrating very favorably, one reason at least for the inauguration of this institution. The hospital's duties are two-fold—one to care for the patients that are brought to it and the other to prepare nurses capable of going out into the world to alleviate the suffering of the sick. The demand for these bearers of hope and dispensers of comfort, of a continuous one and we feel it the duty of the hospital to each year increase the number of their graduates.

We are very proud of those who have already secured their diplomas and the reputation they have made for themselves and for our institution. We are very proud in the knowledge that our hospital graduates are eagerly sought after by many of the larger institutions in the larger cities of Canada and the United States. It must be gratifying to those whom you are honoring here tonight, to know that the splendid training they have received and the knowledge they have acquired, is appreciated and recognized by the general public.

It may be a surprise to those who are not acquainted with the internal management of the hospital, to know how highly our nurses are regarded but to those who are acquainted with our capable and efficient matron and know the painstaking care she takes with her nurses, will realize one of the great reasons why this reputation has been obtained. The doctors can also take considerable credit to themselves in this particular regard, for they have undoubtedly given up abundance of conscientious work to uphold the honor of the institution and to educate nurses who would be a credit to themselves and capable of taking charge of the most critical cases. Your hospital can also take a small portion of the credit, for it is grateful and sure to be continued with modern appliances and conveniences.

It is assuredly an inspiration to a graduate, to realize that she knows her business and feels her ability to cope with an emergency. It is also a satisfaction of the highest degree to the patient and relatives, the vocation that these nurses have chosen for themselves, is of a high order and commands the respect and admiration of all. The work is difficult, the hours are long and the responsibility is great—but the reward amply repays the labor and the worry. They bring hope and comfort out of sorrow and despair; they bring health and happiness where there was worry and anxiety; they bring life and joy where death was knocking at the gates. The labor is great, but the reward is greater.

I would like now, to say a few words in reference to the hospital itself. Eleven years ago, it was started and from the opening of its doors to the present, it has shown its value and has proved that it was a necessity. Last year it had reached the stage where it could not begin to serve the patients who were looking to it for relief. The question naturally arose "Shall we expand or should we still continue to operate as we are?" The project was submitted to the annual meeting last year and they recommended that an addition be added. I need hardly inform you that it was a big undertaking at a time when everything was relatively high but what I can, and do say, is that I admire the spirit that put service to the sick ahead of monetary gain and that voted for the immediate enlargement.

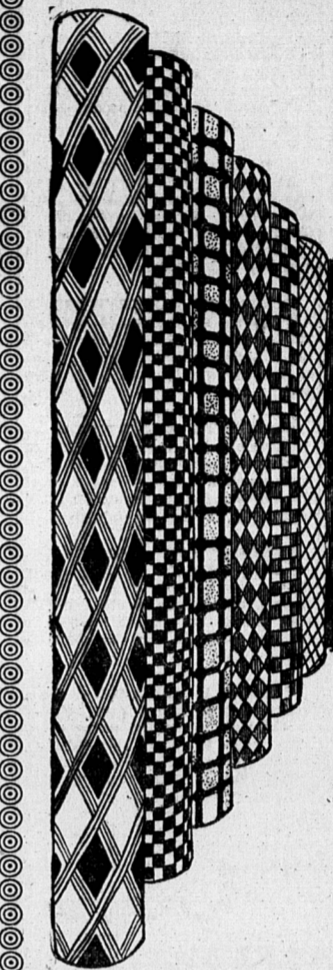
I have another interesting item to divulge to you tonight and that is, that the total cost of the addition, some \$25,000.00 has been subscribed and paid and our Building Account owes absolutely nothing. To accomplish this, we had to use a small portion of the surplus we were carrying in our current account but we anticipate soon, having that all paid back. We consider this to be a most satisfactory showing and we wish to take this opportunity of expressing the appreciation of the Trustees, of the open-heartedness and generosity of the people of Prince County and elsewhere, who have made this enviable financial position possible.

We do not wish you to think, from the foregoing remarks that we will never again approach you for a contribution, but I would remind you that it is a charitable institution and that in all probability, we shortly will have to look to you, one and all, for it and I feel well assured that we will not look in vain. The amount I am glad to say, will be comparatively small so it will not be necessary to start worrying.

One of our objects in the extension of our building, was to provide a home for one of the finest X-ray machines produced. This was presented to us by Dr. Muttart. We have been in correspondence with the makers of this machine for some time and we regret to report that our electric current is such, that the machine is not adapted for it. We had, therefore practically given up hope of receiving it. I was most agreeably surprised last night to receive a letter from Dr. Muttart from Colorado

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saying he had given instructions to have the machine shipped here as we could with our present current use quite a considerable part of it. This machine would represent an outlay of between five and six thousand dollars, so we are naturally very grateful to Dr. Muttart and are exceedingly glad that his success in his life's work has not caused him to forget his Island home.

I would like to trespass on your good nature for just a moment more and to inform you that already this year, although handicapped by our building operations we have served in the hospital some twenty more patients than we did during all of last season and we still have two months before finishing our 1921 records. 514 patients entered our hospital; 12 succumbed; 6 of them of old age; 7 were incurable; 20 were improved and the balance cared of still remaining with us. You will readily realize that the hospital is now an absolute necessity and that it has fulfilled the fondest hopes of its founders and has justified its existence.

I know you will all join with me in expressing the hope that the progress in future will be as satisfactory and as successful as it has been in the past; that each year the graduating nurses will be more numerous; that each year the number of patients served and saved will become larger and larger and that the reputation of the institution will grow and expand until it can take its stand with any in the lower provinces.

We have an exceptionally efficient matron, a staff of exceedingly capable doctors and a hospital that will soon be fully equipped with all modern appliances. We have all that and in addition we have more—we have a Ladies' Aid organized throughout the county that appears to be able through its untiring and unselfish efforts to keep the balance of our finances on the right side of the ledger.

All these advantages spell success and with aught else we will not be satisfied. I thank you, ladies and gentlemen for the patient hearing you have given me.
