AT the Orange picnic at Ellerslie last week an old English and Scotchman named Stewart, aged 89 years of age, danced the Highland fling without making a flaw. The music furnished for the "step" was from the bag pipes, and Stewart said he intends to do better next 12th of July. A ten year old boy named English, at the same picnic, played "The Campbells are Coming" on the bag pipes and was loudly cheered by the audience. The little fellow played the piece with great force.

AT the Opera House last night the Torrie Bros Moving Pictures were shown to a surprised and a delighted audience. The realism of the photographs of the scenes of San Francisco during the great earthquake and fire is amazing, and give a vivid idea of the extent of the calamity. The performance, however, was not wholly devoted to the sombre side. A number of first class humorous pictures were shown, some of the series being exceedingly funny. THE mail train was delayed half an hour last night in coming from Royalty Junction to the City, the cause being a couple of cows encountered on the track near Sherwood Cemetery. One cow was instantly killed and the other seriously mangled. The train, fortunately, suffered no mishap, coming to a stop before any harm, further than the displacing of two wheels of a truck, had occurred. It was lucky that such good fortune attended the accident, for the train had four well-filled passenger coaches. There was a slight anxiety for a while at the Railway Station here, as the train had reported from Royalty and should have been in fifteen minutes after. But a telephone message received from the waterworks, near the scene of the accident, conveyed the good news that no one was hurt.

YESTERDAY an earnest search was begun for some trace of John Feehan, whose disappearance with a sail boat last Tuesday was reported in yesterday's Guardian. Feehan father came over from Rocky Point and was joined by a number of boatmen belonging to town and elsewhere. It was thought that perhaps the boat had drifted under Hillsborough Bridge and been capsized when the mast was caught by the superstructure, and the party spent some time grappling in the vicinity of the bridge. Mr. Feehan thought the boat might be there but could not be sure. He stated that one of the grappling irons which had become fastened to some object was streaked with paint on being drawn to the surface, looking as if it had rubbed against a sunken boat. This was all the foundation for a rumor which spread yesterday that the boat had been located. Subsequently a number of boats dragged for the body, but without success. A curious circumstance in connection with the affair is the fact that a citizen who was walking on the bridge at low water on Sunday noticed what he thought looks very much like a body floating about slightly under the surface of the water near the bridge, but not knowing of the disappearance of Feehan he did not investigate the matter.
