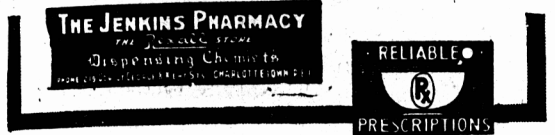

The Boy Scouts Association of India and Pakistan have now been separately recognized by the world organization of the Scout Movement, the International Scout Bureau.

College Girl V. 1. Winner in Oratory

(Daily Colonist, Victoria, B. C.) Miss Anna F. Wootton, student at Victoria College, sponsored by the Knights of Pythias of Victoria, took top honors in the Island finals of the K. of P. public speaking contest. Speakers from various parts of Vancouver Island competed.

Miss Wootton (who is a granddaughter of Mrs. George E. Goff, Charlottetown, P. E. I., whom she visited in 1941) will compete in the British Columbia finals to be held at the lower ballroom of the Crystal Garden, May 20.

Other speakers in the Island finals included Miss Moysa Martin, Port Alberni and David Cottingham, Brentwood Boys' College. Judges of the contest were Frank Paulding, past president of the Y. M. C. A. Public Speaking Club, and Don Harvey.

Two of the most interesting plays to be presented by a Victoria dramatic group in a long time were "Gruch" by Gordon Bottomley, and a short version in one scene of Goldsmith's "She Stoops to Conquer," put on last evening at the Memorial Hall by the St. Barnabas Players.

Although handicapped by lack of lighting equipment, the atmosphere was well brought out by the very clever sets.

As "Gruch" or a Gaelic word meaning cruel or harsh, Anna Wootton was excellent. Portraying the young girl who afterwards became Lady MacBeth, her well-modulated beautifully flexible speaking voice, quick change of mood, and remarkable maturity of approach to a very difficult role were a pleasure to hear and watch. The sleep-walking scene especially was well handled.

Gwen Downs, as Lady Fortingall, did her usual well-learned, varied and professionally smooth portrayal of a character role. Ron Wilton as MacBeth, envoy of the King of Scotland, was convincing, his projection, stage movements, and ability to get well into character before his entrances being most commendable.

As Charles Marlow in "She Stoops to Conquer," Mr. Wilson proved his versatility with an equally artistic and finished portrayal of a comedy role. Perle Alaric was a delightful Kaia, particularly in her business with her fan and handkerchief. Mary Bullock, as Constance Neville, was a charming young miss whose costume calls for special mention.
