AUSTRIA IS LOOKING FOR SEPARATE PEACE

Emperor's Visit to Vienna was to Put Stop to Austria's Efforts to Make Separate Peace. Vienna and Berlin Disagree on Negotiations.

ROME, Dec. 1, via Paris.—The real object of the Emperor William's visit to Vienna was to put a stop to efforts Austria is making, by means of negotiations through Madrid, with the Vatican, to obtain a separate peace with the Quadruple Entente, says the Tribune.

EARL KITCHENER WILL REPORT ON THE BALKAN SITUATION

Visit of Sir John French to London Coincident with Kitchener's Return Regarded as Significant in View of Balkan Mixup.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—Lord Kitchener will report at once to King George and Premier Asquith concerning his observations on the Gallipoli Peninsula and at Saloniki, and his consultations with King Constantine of Greece, King Victor Emmanuel of Italy and Lieut-General Cadorna, the Italian commander-in-chief, and the French Government heads.

AUSTRO-GERMAN TROOPS MOVED TO ROUMANIAN BORDER

LONDON, Dec. 1.—A despatch to the Morning Post from Bucharest dated Tuesday, says: "Feverish preparations are being made at Ruscuk, on the Danube, west of the Rumanian border, to accommodate fifty thousand Austro-German troops who are due to arrive there shortly."

VIENNA REPORT ON ANCONA AFFAIR NOT READY YET

WASHINGTON, December 1.—The Austro-Hungarian government has in Vienna that it desires more time to compile a formal statement regarding the sinking of the Italian steamship Ancona.

SERBIA WILL DEFEND MONASTIR TILL THE LAST

PARIS, Dec. 1.—The unavailing efforts of the Serbians to prevent the Bulgarians from advancing on Monastir are described in a despatch received from the Havas Agency. He says that the battle along the Carassou River, North of Monastir, began on Friday morning and continued for 24 hours.

FOUR CHILDREN DROWNED IN QUEBEC

SAWYERVILLE, Que., Dec. 1.—Mr. and Mrs. Achille Gaultin, of this place, lost their four young children on Saturday by drowning. The children were aged ten, nine, eight and six.

SOCIALISTS STAND BY GOVERNMENT

LONDON, Nov. 30.—Resolutions in opposition to the attitude of Dr Karl Liebknecht, the Socialist leader whose questions in the Reichstag regarding peace have been the subject of much discussion, were passed by Socialist members of the Reichstag, according to a despatch from Berlin to-day, forwarded by Reuters correspondent at Amsterdam.

THIRTY WORKMEN HURLED TO DEATH

In Plant of Dupont Powder Company at Wilmington, Del. Warnings had been Posted Previously Advising Germans to Leave Works.

WILMINGTON, Delaware, Nov. 30.—Thirty workmen were killed and seven fatally injured today in a terrific explosion of about four tons of black powder at the Upper Hagley yard of the Dupont Powder Company. It was the worst accident that has occurred in any of the company's plants in a quarter of a century.

MONASTIR HAS SURRENDERED TO BULGARIANS

LONDON, Dec. 1.—Monastir was formally surrendered to the Bulgarians on Monday, according to a despatch to the Daily Telegraph.
